THIRD AND FOURTH GRADE ROOM

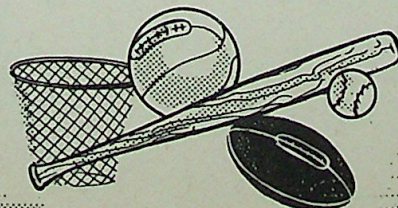
We have a weather calender in our room. We change it the first of each month.

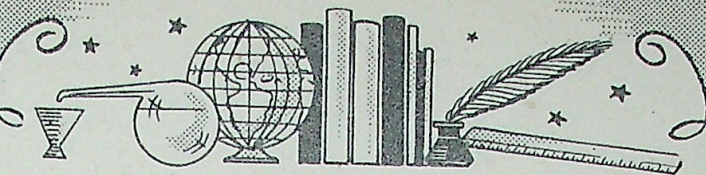
FIFTH AND SIXTH GRADES

Flora Jones is private secretary to the producer and director Leslie Fenton.


Phyllis Finney is singing with Vaughn Monroe's orchestra. Never thought she was the career type.

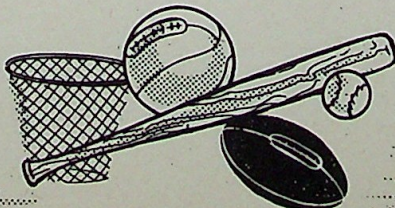



In our Junior year, Harry Kimball was elected president, Leo Bartner, vice president; Betty Good, Secretary; Bob Staton, treasurer; Mrs. Cecil Bennington and Mrs. H. A. McQueen class sponsors. Of course the crowning event of this year was the Junior Reception held at Catherine's Tearoom. The rooms were beautifully decorated with Senior colors. Graceful Hawaiian music was furnished throughout dinner by Honolulu Serenaders. Following the dinner all were invited to hear a concert by the Indianapolis Symphony. Our class play was "Grandad Steps Out", a comedy enjoyed by everyone. All of the class purchased gold and blue class sweaters with W.H.S. and '46 on them.

Early in January we began work on our Annual "Memoir". This proved a most interesting new adventure for us.


Our Senior play will be presented on April 5.

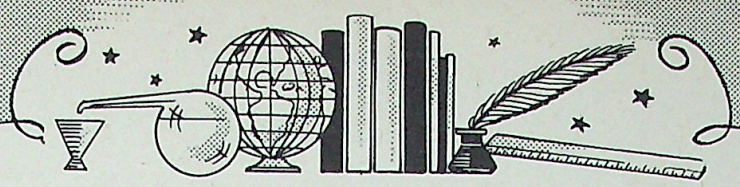
We are looking forward to the Junior reception March 30. We know this will be a most brilliant social affair.

The monthly meetings have offered interesting programs. The sponsor is Olive Casey.

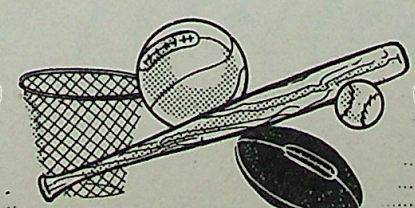
Alumni 1916-1946

During the summer vacation of 1945, the Whitestown High School softball team entered a softball league at Zionsville. In the league with the Panthers was; Carmel, Pike Twp., and Zionsville.

During this summer league which was played on Tuesday nights, the Panthers won 10 games and lost 2 to maintain a tie with Zionsville at the close of the season. Each team closed with a won 10 lost 2 record so this called for a playoff for the championship trophy.

The following week the Panthers Journeyed to Zionsville for the last and final battle with the Eagles.

Both teams were determined and anxious to win the trophy, so at seven thirty, the Panthers coach, J. S. Haines, sent W. Staton to first base, Don Dye to second base, R. Staton to third base, Ralph Roseboom to Shortstop, C. Staton to short field, Stum to right field, George to left field, Strawmyer to center field, Clemens to pitch, and Kimball to catch, to see what they could do with the Eagles.

It didn't take them long to find out that the Eagles "meant business" for they jumped into an early lead and never did relinquish it. After seven innings of hard playing the Panthers went down in defeat and the Eagles walked off with the bacon. Bob Kouns led the Eagle attack by slamming out a "three run homer" in the fifth.

After school had started the Panthers entered the Boone County softball league with Zionsville, Jamestown, Advance, Lebanon, Dover, Pinnell, Perry Central and Thorntown.

The first four games were on the road for the Panthers and they broke even, winning from Pinnell and Advance and losing to Thorntown and Lebanon.

Perry Central was the first home victim for the Panthers and they won by a safe margin.

In the next three remaining games the Panthers won from Jamestown and Dover and again lost to their "old Rivals", Zionsville.

The Panthers finished in fourth place behind Zionsville, Thorntown, and Lebanon, with 5 victories and 3 defeats.

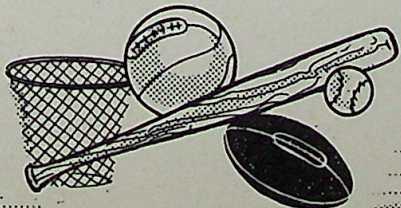
The team raked up a pretty good record during the entire season winning 16 games while only losing 6.

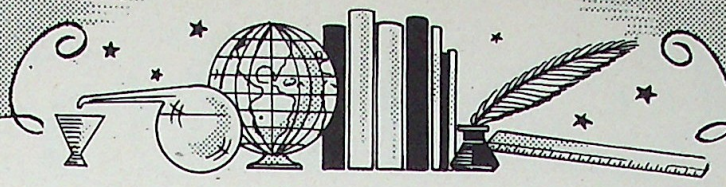
"Basketball" now began wandering through the minds of the boys and in the early part of October, J. S. Haines, coach, began sending his boys through practice sessions to put them in shape for the opening game with Carmel at Whitestown.

On November 2, at 8:00 pm Mr. Haines sent his starting lineup which-- consisted of John Stum and Harry Kimball at forwards, Jack Clemens at center W. Staton and R. Staton at guards against a much larger Carmel five. It took only one quarter to decide the out-come of the game, for the Panthers completely outplayed and outshot their opponents and jumped into a first quarter lead of 12 points. The Panthers came through with a decisive 47-27 victory.

The next victim for the Panthers was the small, unexperienced Advance five and the Panthers had little trouble in winning by a 59-21 score.

After handing the Pinnell Dragons a 72-21, thumping, the "undefeated" Whitestown boys traveled to Thorntown with fire in their eyes for the four defeats handed to them by the Kawaskees during the previous season. The Panther players never forgot this during any of the four quarters and when the final gun "barked" the scoreboard read; Whitestown 38, Thorntown 21, so this ended a long reign of victories for the Kawaskees.

Next came the "outstanding" game of the year, which brought Zionsville, also undefeated, to Whitestown for the first of the home and home games between the two schools. When the two teams took the floor, the gymnasium was packed, and both sides had a different opinion of which team would remain undefeated. The Panthers jumped into a 7 point lead in the first quarter in front 18-14 at the half. After receiving instructions from their coach, J. S. Haines, the Panthers went back for the second half. In the next game with Perry Central, the Panthers went on a scoring spree and rolled over the Midgets to the tune of 76-24.

After defeating Carmel 23-18 over there, the Panthers journeyed to the "Eagles Nest" at Zionsville and were well aware of the fact that the Eagles were out for revenge. But again the Whitestown boys gave them a lesson, This lesson ended in a 49-37 defeat for Zionsville.

On January 4, Dover came to Whitestown for a return game with the Panthers and were sent back on the short end of a 36-30 score.

Next came the County Tourney; which had been looked forward to for the Panthers for a long time, and Whitestown had the honor of going to Lebanon undefeated in ten games.

On Saturday January 19 at 12:00 o'clock the Panthers, along with Mr. Haines, left for Plainfield to play a game with the Charlton Boys School. After winning an easy 58-23 victory, Mr. Haines took his boys to Indianapolis, ate supper, and then went to the Loew's theater and saw a show.

On the following Tuesday night, the Panthers traveled to New Augusta and played a "socalled football game" with the Red Devils and after four quarters of rough and tumble ballplaying came out on top 35-20.

Thorntown came to Whitestown on January 25 for a return game and the Panthers sent them back defeated 45-25.

Perry Central received a setback on their floor by the Panthers, on February 1. The Whitestown boys had trouble hitting the basket and weren't very impressive with their 41-31 victory over the Midgets. This made the Panthers 17 victories without a defeat.

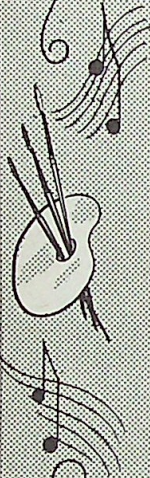
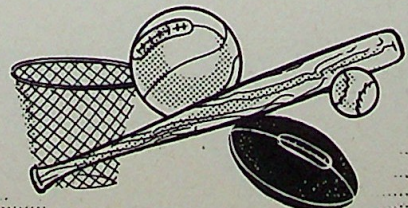

Panthers Rate High In Teams Standing

New York, Feb. 4--Bosse High of Evansville, rated at 67.8, was the strongest quintet out of 707 rated high schools playing basketball in Indiana through games of January 29, according to the Coca-Cola-Dunkel, rating released by the Scholastic Sports Institute.

Following Bosse among the state-wide leaders were Rossville, 66.6; Central of Evansville, 67.5; Boonville, 65.8; New Albany, 65.7; Central of South Bend, 64.4; Jasper, 64.3; Angola, 63.1; Memorial of Evansville, 63.0; and Clark of Hammond, 62.8; in that order, to round out the ten top teams in the ratings, which are based on cumulative records of the teams.

Leading the North section was Central of South Bend at 64.4; followed by Angola, Clark, Elkhart and Washington of East Chicago. In the Central group, Rossville held the edge trailed by Morristown, Richmond, Lafayette, and Whitestown. While in the Southern group, Bosse set the pace with Central Evansville, Boonville, New Albany and Jasper behind.

Bosse's rating of 67.8, means that it is 67 potential points stronger than the weakest team in Indiana, and all teams can be compared on that basis.

Defeat Eagles In Final Game

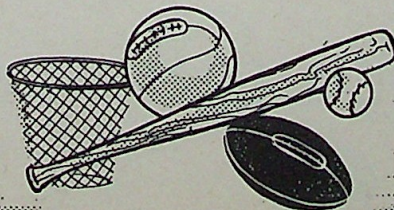

The band marched into the Gym and played various numbers including "Loyal Sons" while the W.H.S. students sang their school song.

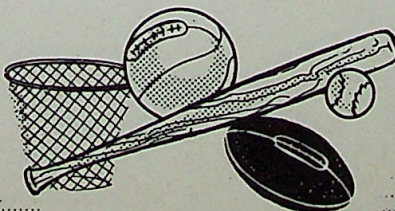
Mr. Davis introduced the Zionsville coach, Alfred Rosenstihl, who gave a brief talk on "Hoosier Basketball."

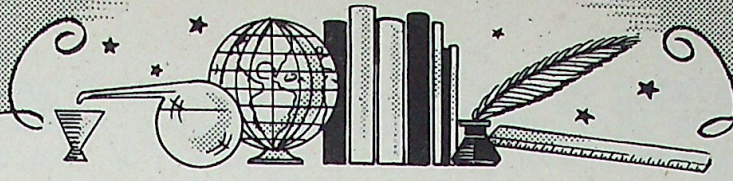
Bob Kouns, captain of the Zionsville team, also wished the Panthers and Mr. Haines the best luck at Lafayette.

Five members of the Whitestown High School basketball squad of 1945-46 will graduate from High School this April. They are:

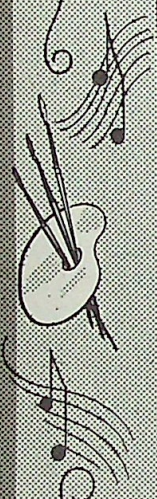
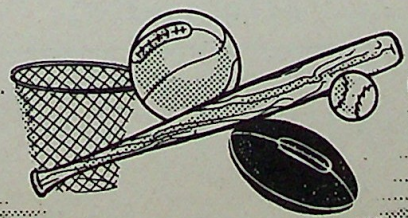
