During this year we lost Bob Durham, Gene Neese and Jim Swinford. But we also gained a new member, Helen Meredith.

The class officers for this year were: Jack Tucker, President; Gene Revell, Vice-President; Shirley Kimble, Secretary and Treasurer; Mary Alice Van Hook, Class Reporter; Barbara Kimball, Student Council; and Mrs. Hulda Shepherd, Sponsor.

When fall came again the Sophomores were found worrying about what subjects to take. And also the problem of making money. We sold advertisements and placed them on the backs of the basketball programs.

A wiener roast was held the first semester and a skating party the second semester. Also the second semester we sold booster pins and chances on a floor lamp. Besides this we sold popcorn at all home basketball games. During this year we lost Gene Revell.

Class officers for this year were: President, Mary Alice Van Hook; Vice-President, Butch Frick; Secretary and Treasurer, Billy Dodson; and Sponsor, Mrs. Hulda M. Shepherd.

During the Junior year we welcomed two new students into our class; Evelyn Eytcheson from Westfield High School, and Clarence Neal from Zionsville High School.

We elected Helen Meredith, President; Bill Dodson, Vice-President; Mary Alice Van Hook, Secretary and Treasurer; Evelyn Eytcheson, Student Council; and again Mrs. Hulda Shepherd was our Sponsor.

We sold candy, ice cream and cold drinks at all home ball games and at noon of school days. We gathered scrap iron and sold it at Indianapolis.

When we came back to school as SENIORS, we had lost Norma Allen, Shirley Kimble and Clarence Neal. We elected the following officers; Hubert Gene Etter, President; Eugene Frick, Vice-President; Evelyn Eytcheson, Secretary and Treasurer; Dorothy Neese, Student Council; Jack Tucker, Class Reporter; and again Mrs. Hulda Shepherd was our Sponsor.

Our first semester party which was a wiener roast and a hayride was enjoyed by approximately twenty-two members and guests.

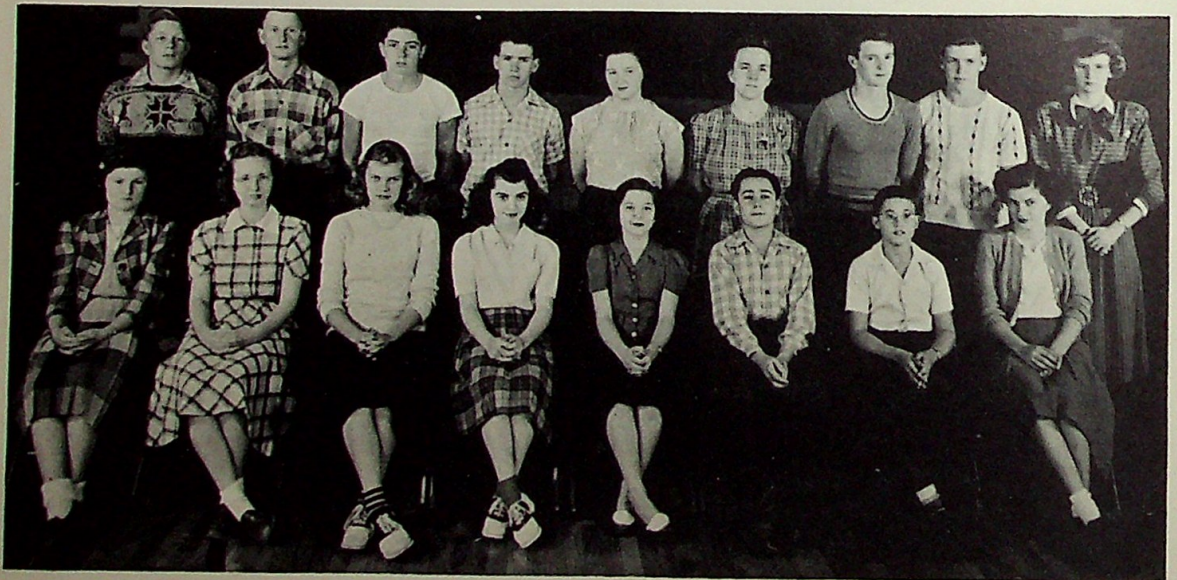
We are now looking forward to the second semester party which will be held sometime in March.
