At the start of the Sophomore year there were twenty-one enrolled including: Stanley Beck and Johnathan Bankert. Our money making schemes were: selling popcorn at ball games and also advertisements on basketball programs.

Our class officers were: Joe Shoemaker, President; Stanley Beck, Vice-President; LaVerne Barton, Secretary and Treasurer.

The class welcomed Joy Ann Gould, the first semester; but were unfortunate to lose Dorothy Shoemaker.

Our projects for the year were selling soft drinks, candy, and chances on a coffee maker.

In October of our Senior year we lost LaVaughn Clark one of our oldest members and most able athlete.

Officers elected for the '50-'51 school year of the Senior Class were: Patty Clemens, President; Frank Strawmyer, Vice-President; and Norman VanHook, Secretary and Treasurer.

Our projects for the year included: selling Christmas cards and magazines. For Christmas we sold chances on a turkey, which was given away at the Noblesville and Whitestown basketball game. Later we started and produced an annual which was enjoyed by everyone who took part.



Last November Canterbury College chose Queens from all Boone County for their football game with St. Joseph's. Patty Clemens, our Senior President was chosen Queen with Joy Gould and Patty Kouns as her attendants.

The Senior Class was fortunate enough to have three members who had been in the class all through the twelve years. They were; Eddie Hine, Bobby Hancock, and Clifford Cline.

The Senior Class was one of the few classes who in many years have had one or more students who have had both parents graduate from Whitestown High School. Bobby Hancock's parents are both graduates of this high school, We are proud to have this occasion in our class and wish Bob and his parents both all the luck in the world.

Our play, "Always in Trouble," consisting of three-acts, will be given March 30, 1951.

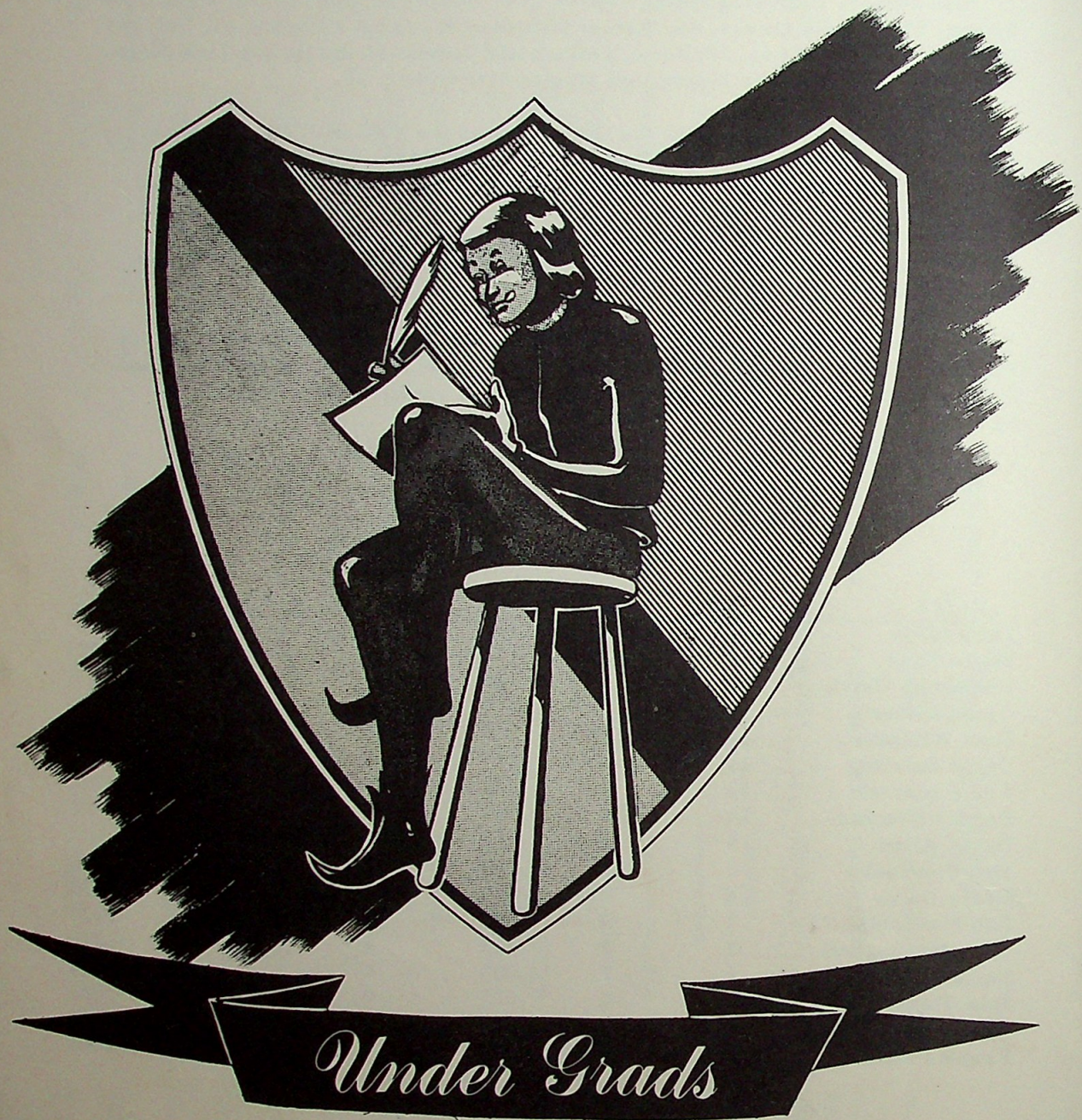

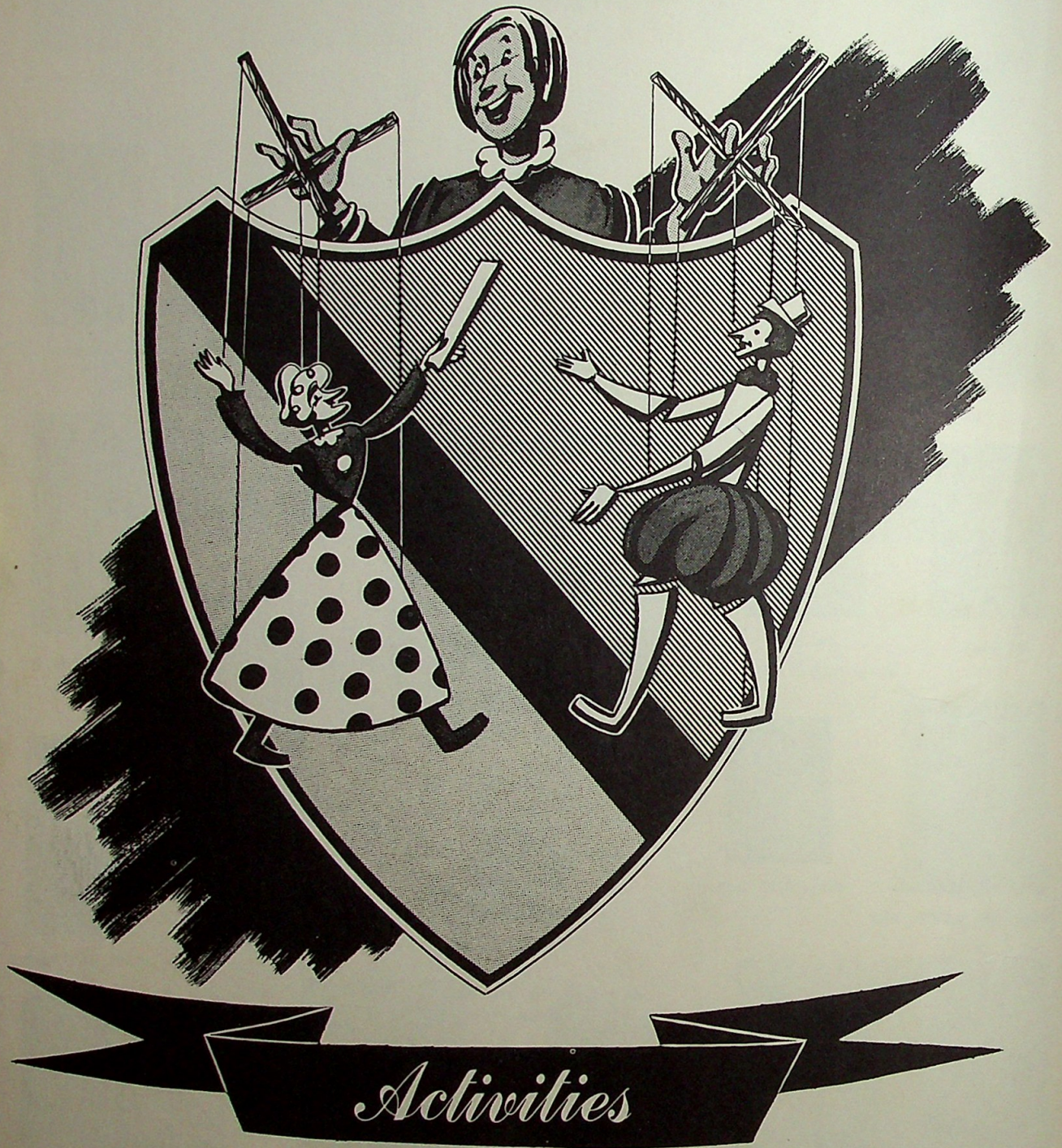

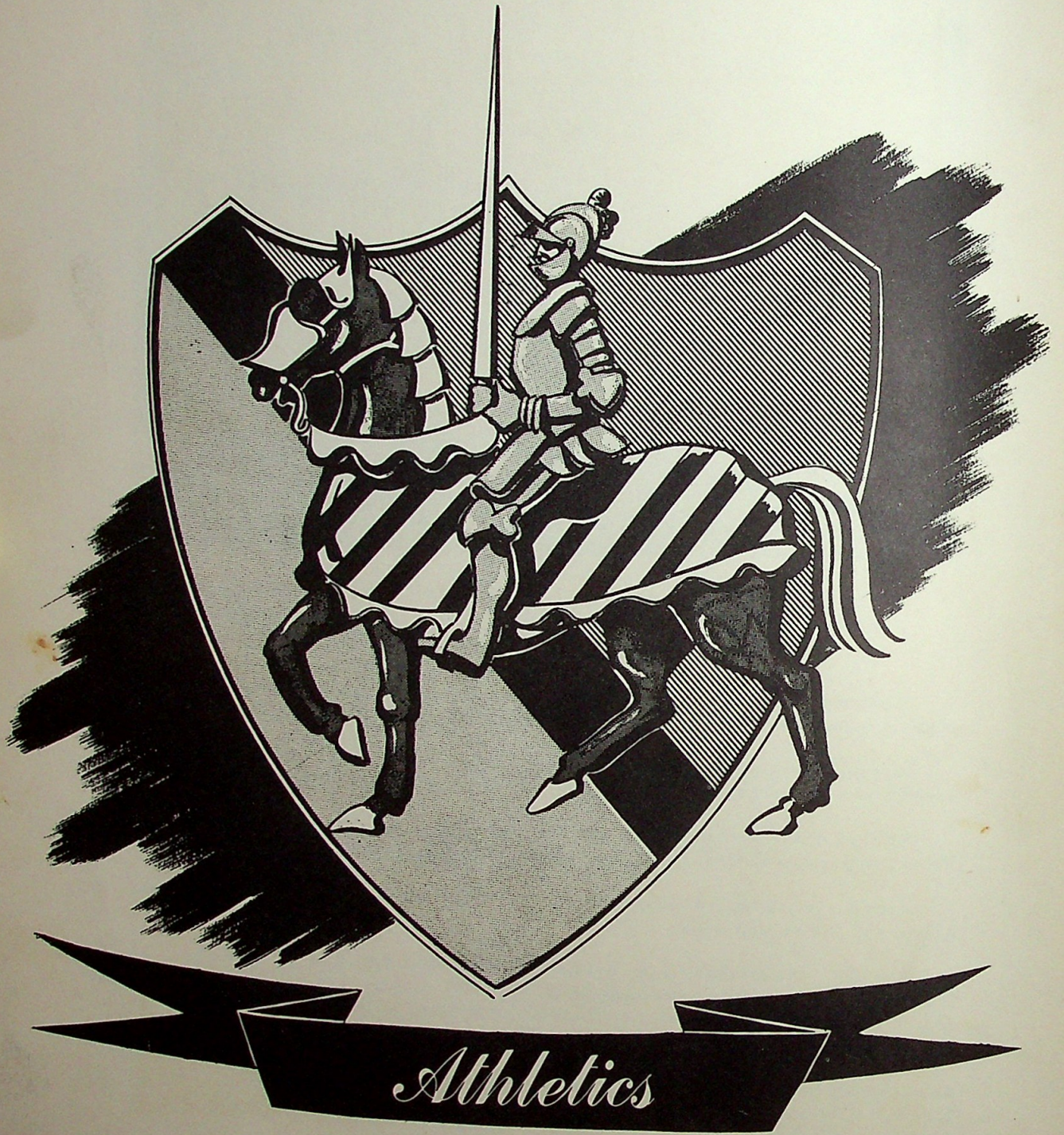

## County Tourney

### DOVER VS WHITESTOWN

Had Dover been able to throttle Center, LaVerne Barton, of Whitestown the "Blue Devils," might have been able to stay in the Tourney.

Barton, one of the most effective scorers in the county, tallied 15 points in the first half as Whitestown led all the way from early in the first period.

In the last half, Coach, Fay Trammel, put what amounted to three men on Barton and held him to a pair of field goals, but Eddie Hine came to the rescue and pumped in 10 points in the last two periods to keep the "Panthers" on top.

Dover had leads of 1-0 and 5-3, but Barton hit two in a row from the pivot post and the "Blue Devils" were behind to stay.

After trailing 29-17 early in the third period, Dover pulled up to 31-25 but two free throws by Ed Hine and Barton's seventh bucket took the "Panthers" out of danger for the time being.

LaVerne Barton staged the "Panthers" rally with 21 points, while George Gormat with 15 and Art Wooten with 10, were outstanding for the hosts. The "B" team went down to defeat No. 10.

## PERRY CENTRAL VS WHITESTOWN

January 26, 1951

Whitestown "Panthers" out for revenge handed the Central "Midgets," a 57-47 defeat on the "Panthers" home floor.

The "Panthers" started off hot and continued that way during the speedy classic. LaVerne Barton took scoring honors with 21 points but had plenty of help from Ted Anderson and Dave Shirling who had 17 and 11 respectively. B. Smith and Glendenning led the "Midgets" scoring parade but was for a losing cause.

The "B" team celebrated by whopping the "Midgets" "B" team by a big margin, the first this year.

## ZIONSVILLE VS WHITESTOWN

Febrary 2, 1951

The "Eagle"- "Panther" clash was close for three quarters but in the final period Zionsville doubled the score on Whitestown, 20-10.

Norman Line: Norman made the "B" team his Sophomore year and the following two years found him on the Varsity team. Norman will receive two stripes on his sweater.

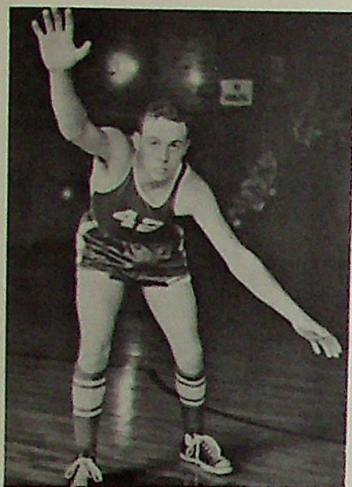
