"Is this a debit or a credit entry?" . . . "fff space jjj space" . . . "Is the letter 'a' the small or large circle?" . . . "How do you solve this problem?" These and various other remarks have been heard all year in the Commercial Department.

Twenty-two students were enrolled in the classes, consisting of Beginning and Advanced Typewriting, Beginning Bookkeeping, Beginning Stenography, and General Business.

Certificates and pins were awarded to typing students for ten-minute writings with four or less errors.

Thirty words per minute were required for certificates which have been won by Tom Cunningham, Myron Dickerson, Bill Smith, Lowell Wing, Dorothy Bowen, Kent Glendenning, Charles Bailey, and Tom Waggoner.

Requirements for bronze pins were at least 40 words per minute. Pins were awarded to Tom Cunningham, Myron Dickerson, and Lowell Wing.

Silver typing pins were awarded for typing at least 50 words per minute. Pins were won by Tom Cunningham.

Requirements for gold pins are at least 60 words per minute for ten minutes. Tom Cunningham has been awarded this pin.

SHOP CLASS

A number of the high school boys are taking the Agriculture and Farm Shop course. This has included studying and making out farm practices of such subjects as dairying, feeding cattle or hogs, farm machinery maintenance, and methods of crop production.

The second part of the course included shop works, where such things as gates, benches, cabinets, yard tables, book cases, gate herders, and other things were constructed.

This is the first year in a long time that we have had a chemistry class. New equipment was bought at the beginning of the year. About eighty experiments were performed during the year.

The teaching of chemistry with physics and biology gives three full years of laboratory science in our high school, allowing students to complete a major in science.

HOME ECONOMICS CLASS

The Home Economics class of Perry Central studied Foods the first semester. Facilities of the school kitchen were used and breakfast and luncheon dishes were served at various times to members of the faculty and students. One memorable luncheon was held with the freshmen boys and Mr. Ratliff in attendance. The freshmen boys were surprised to discover that the freshmen girls could cook.

The second semester of Home Economics is Sewing. Skirts, vests, and other garments are being made. A style show and tea will be co-sponsored in April with the Sunshine Society. Mothers of the Home Economics students will attend as well as ideal ladies of the Sunshine Society.

BASKETBALL BANQUET

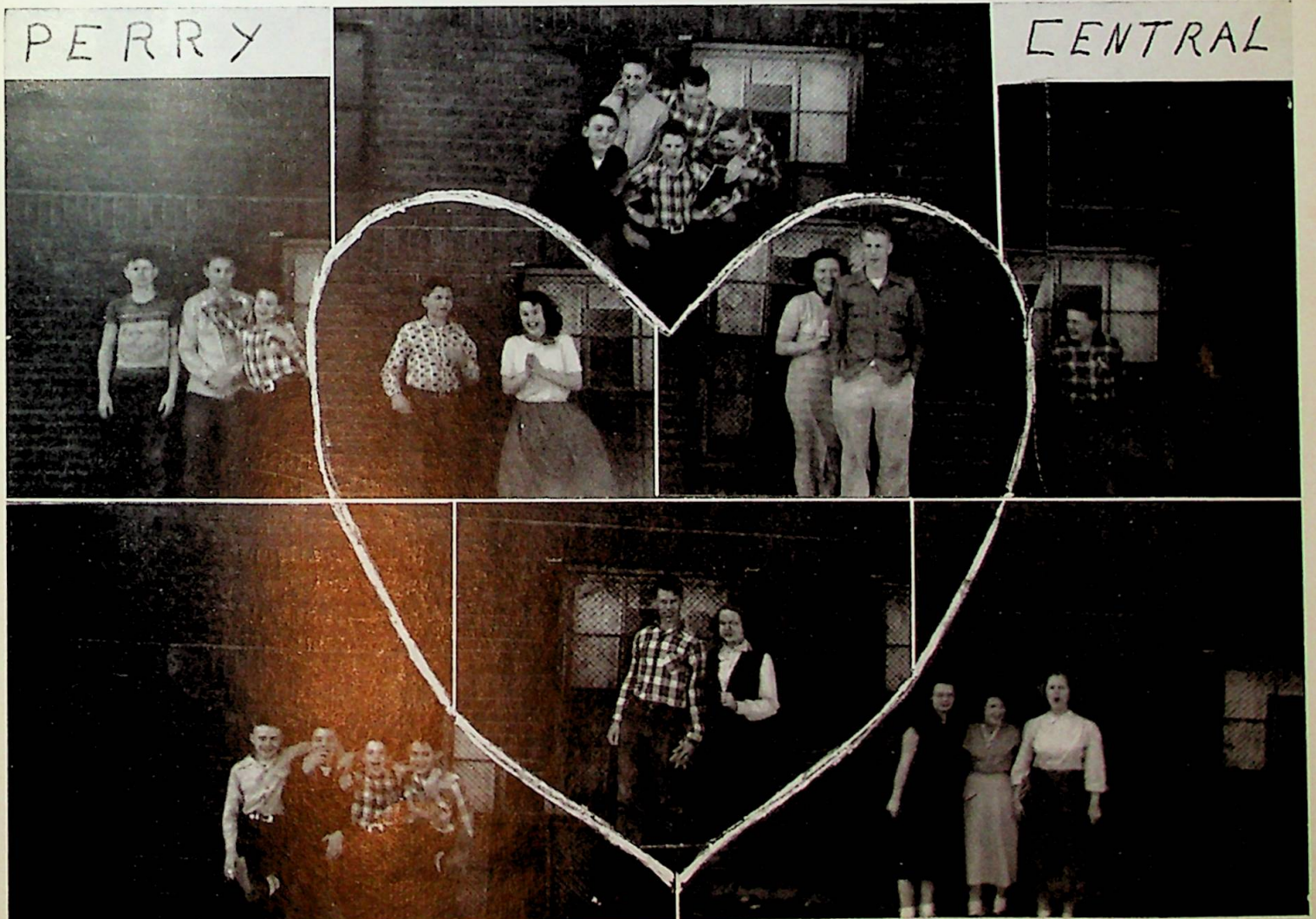
Our annual basketball banquet, sponsored by the Parent - Teachers Association and Athletic Association, was held in the gymnasium, March 20.

Mr. H. C. Benedict, president of the State Athletic Council, was the guest speaker.

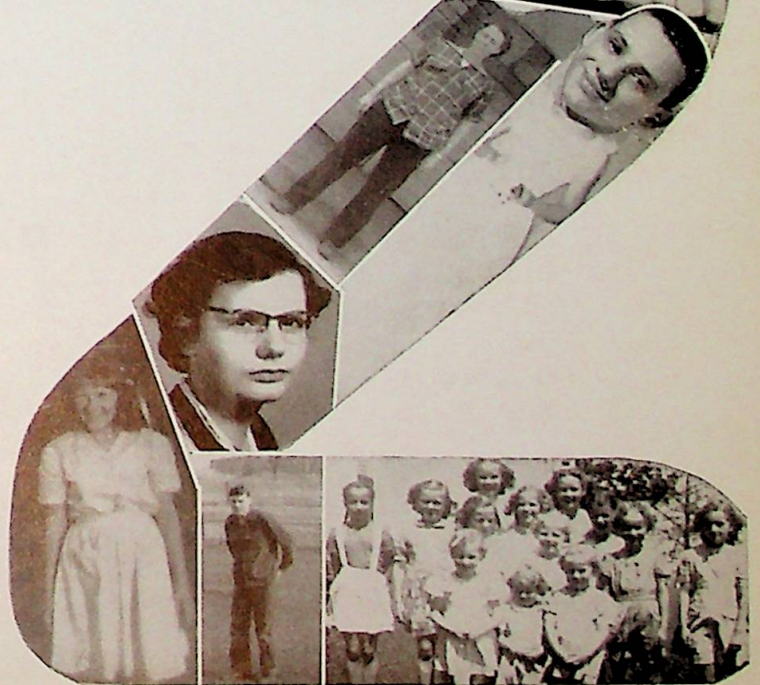
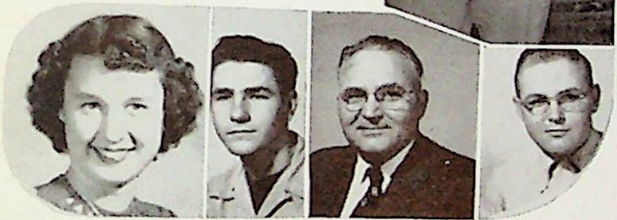

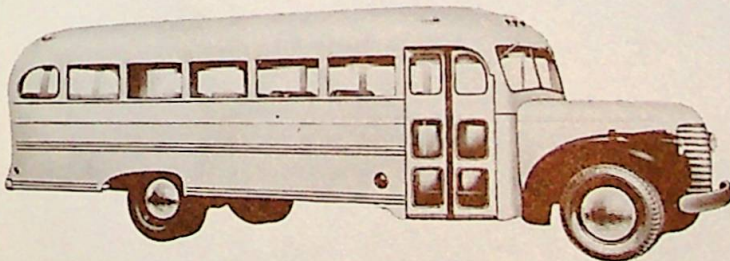
