Money-making projects consisted of selling school supplies and chili supper before and after the Jackson basketball game and a bake sale at Bowers' Electric Store.

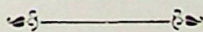
Charitable projects included: donations to the Heart Fund, March of Dimes, Red Cross, Crippled Childrens' Fund, and Riley Hospital Fund.
