During the business session conducted by President Raymond Powell the following officers were nominated and elected for the ensuing year: President, Donald Small; first vice president, Carl Livengood; second vice, Lloyd Smith; third vice, Robert McKinzie; secretary-treasurer, Monta Robertson; tall twisters, James VanMeter and Don Hoover, Lion tamer, Rev. James E. Byrd; and directors, Arthur Whitmore and Charles Carey.

The club voted to sponsor the annual Easter Egg Hunt for children at the School Park. Each member is requested to take one dozen colored eggs to the school or Regal Store April 14.

A committee consisting of Charles Kouns, Harold Miller, Mrs. Lloyd Smith, Mrs. Joe Shanklin and Mrs. Don Hoover, was named to take charge of the hunt.

Mr. Livengood read the annual financial report, followed with a discussion on future activities. It was suggested that those interested in organizing a Bowling League

April 21 was announced as the date for the District 25-C banquet to be held at Crawfordsville.

He also remarked that the program could be designed to interest men and women as well as teen-agers and young people and that a survey should be taken to see what pastime, interest or hobby the youth and adults prefer.

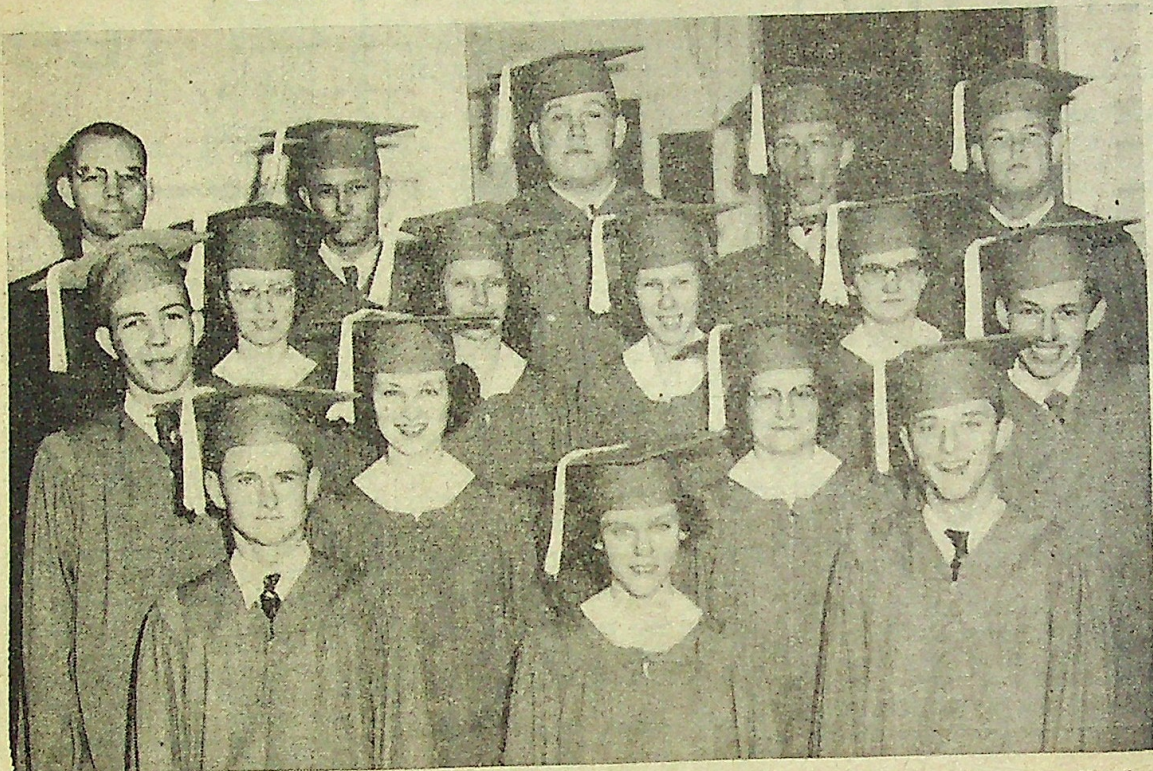

May 3--7:25 AM Arrive Washington DC, detrain and board our sightseeing bus, transferring to the Hotel Harrington for breakfast. (Check into rooms at noon.)
