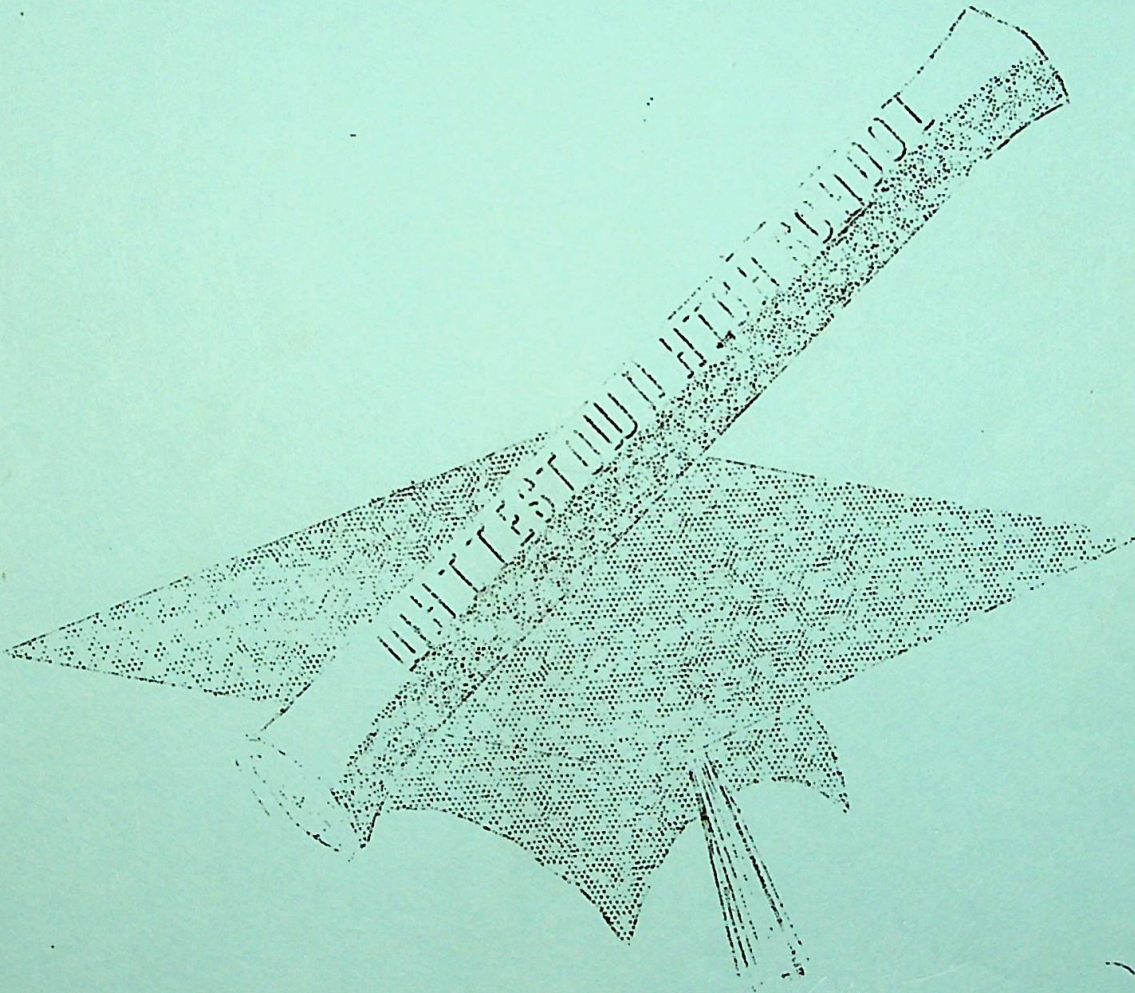
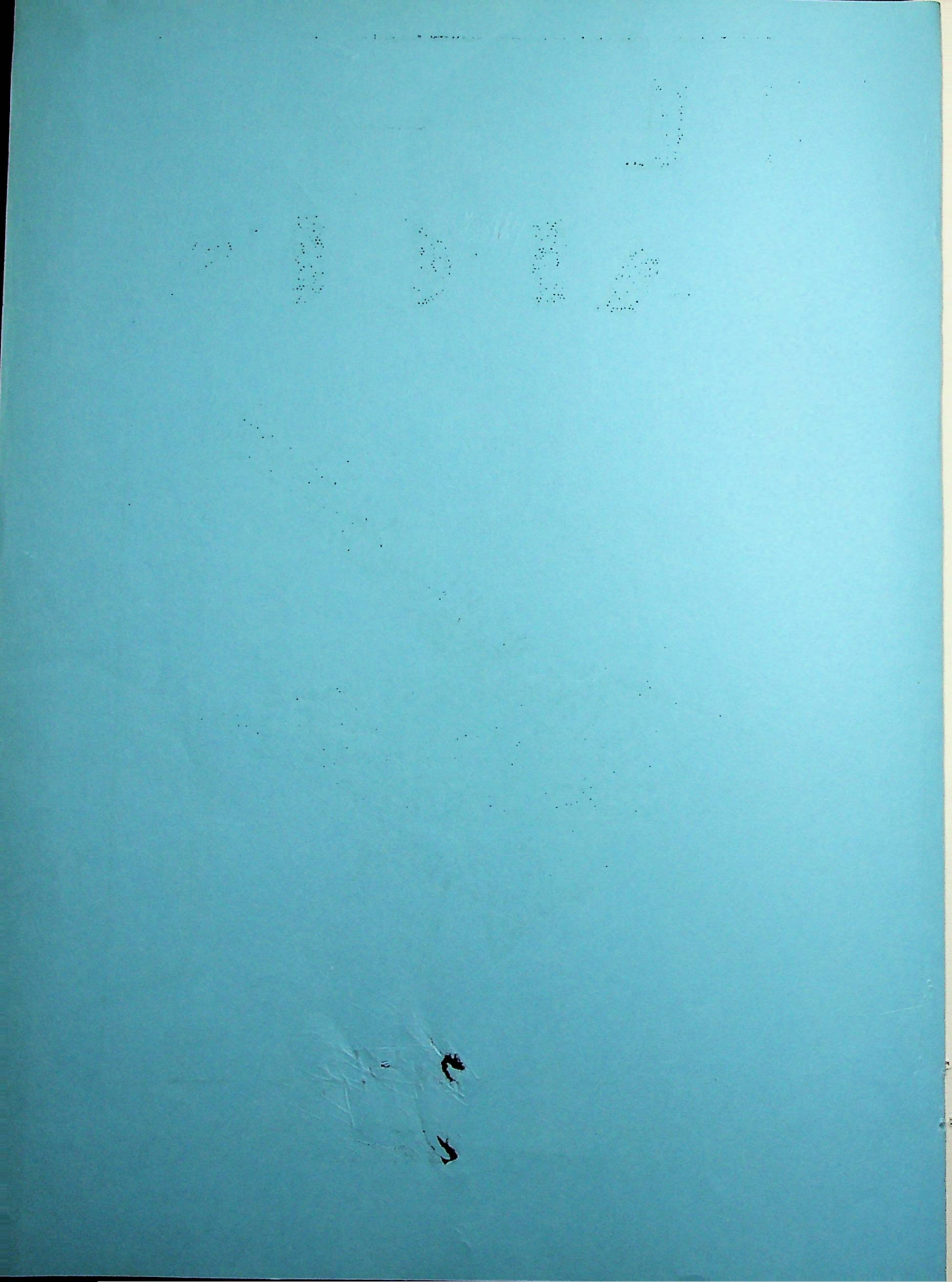

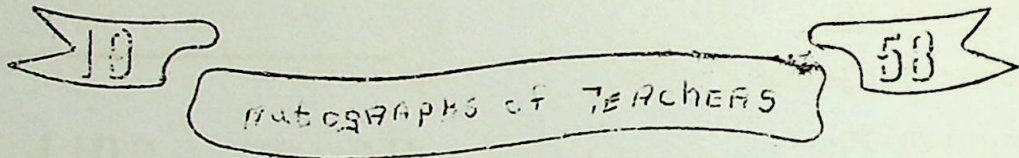

As we are nearing the end of our school years, we would like to pay tribute to two teachers that have been our guiding light in the publishing of The Argus.

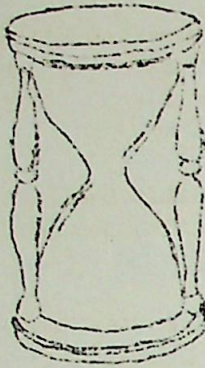

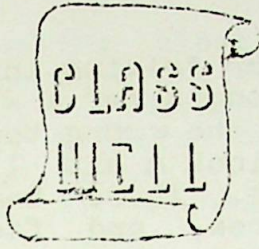
Our first semester party occurred at Christmas time at Barb Miller's house. The second party of the year was at Wesley Beck's house. We had a weiner roast and all had a good time.

I, Barb Miller, will my ability to dance to Roy Hossfeld.

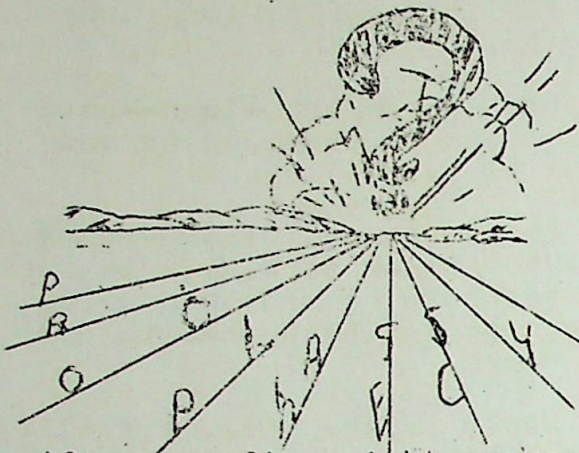
I, Jo Powell, will the job of working in the office to any Sophomore girl that wants it.

ated in 1938.

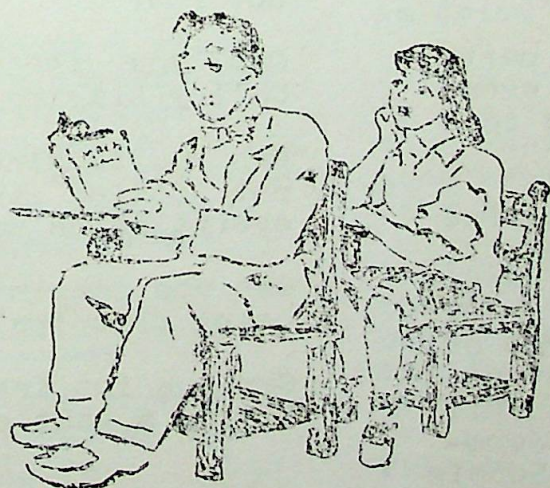
Mrs. Byrkett graduated with

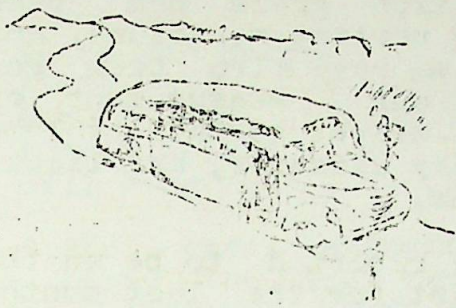

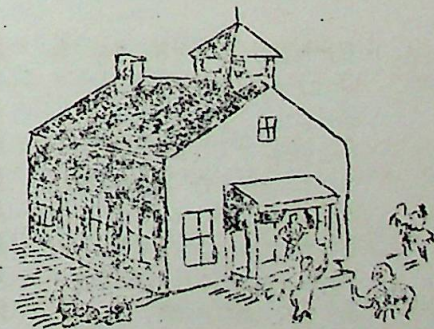
