Through our grade school days many new students moved in, and some of our classmates moved out.

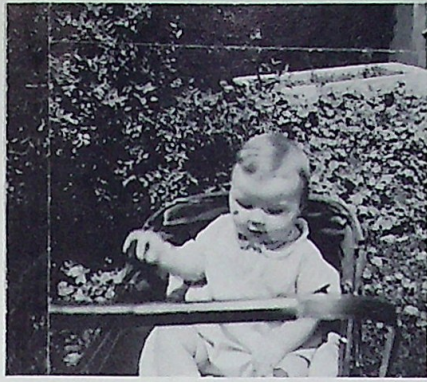
