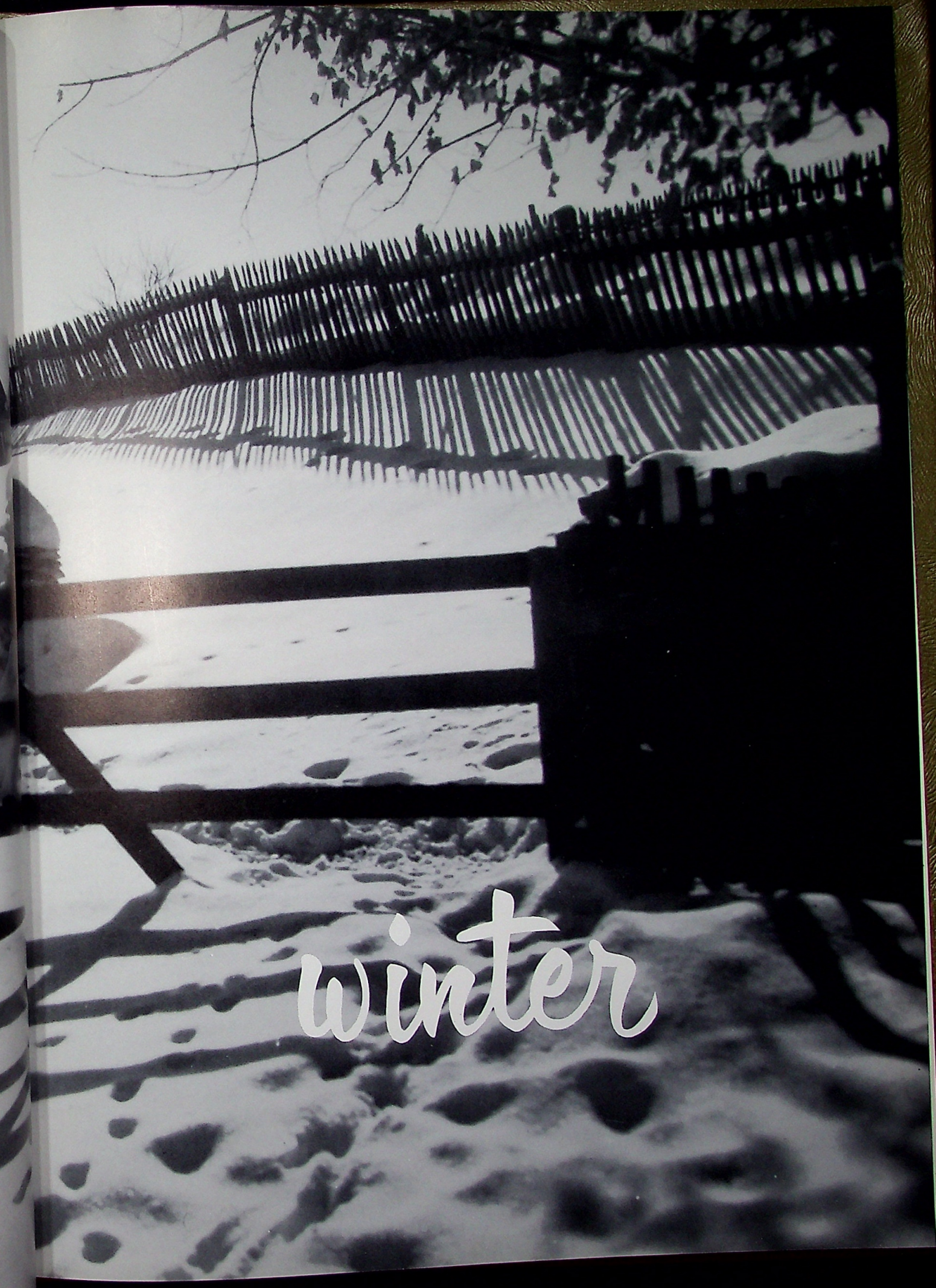

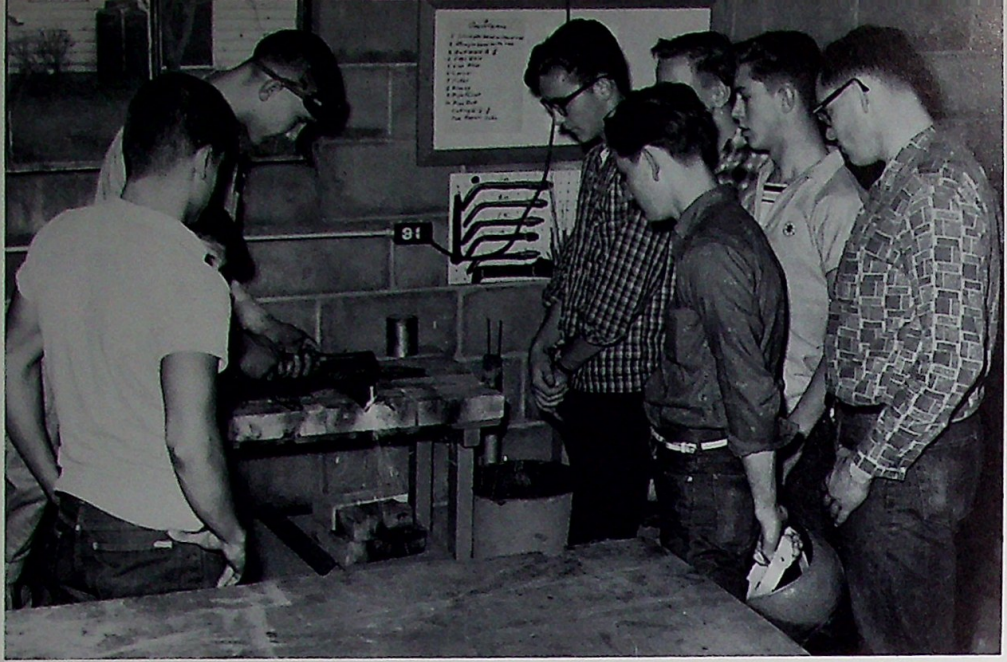

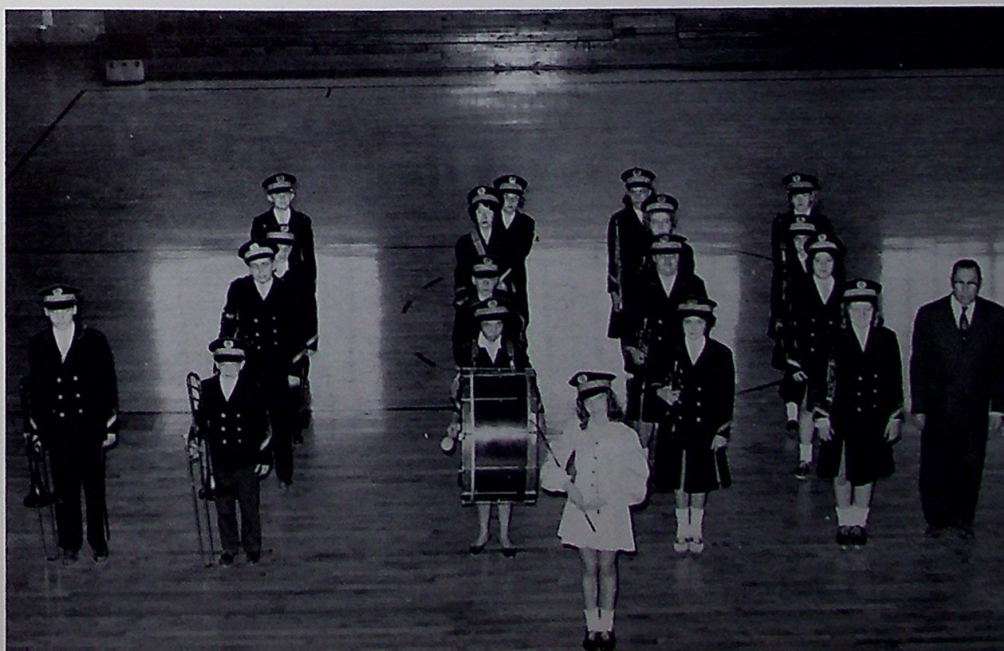

A new course this year, psychology, finds these eight students duly impressed. With Mr. Robinson as instructor, they are learning just "what makes people tick."

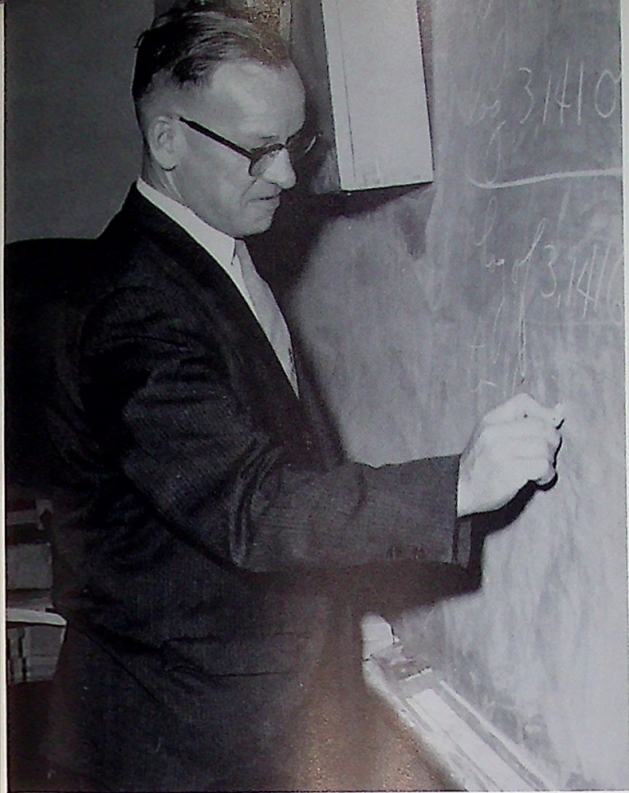


It takes a certain amount of skill to perform the various types of gymnastics that the boys' physical education class learns. They also learn how to keep physically fit.

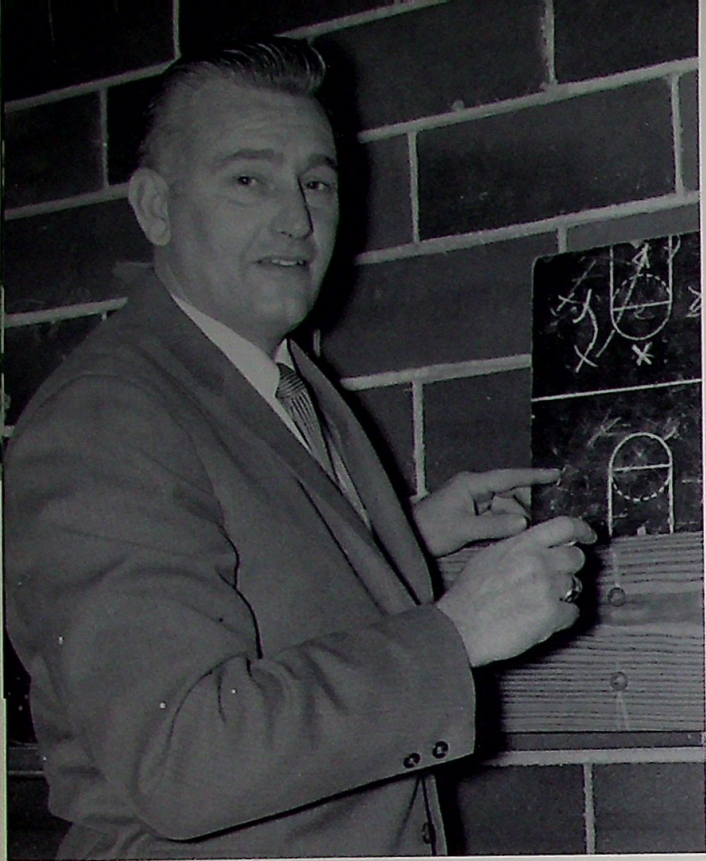

As athletic director, Mr. Melson coaches the track, baseball, and basketball teams. He also teaches drivers education, health and safety, biology, and boys' physical education.

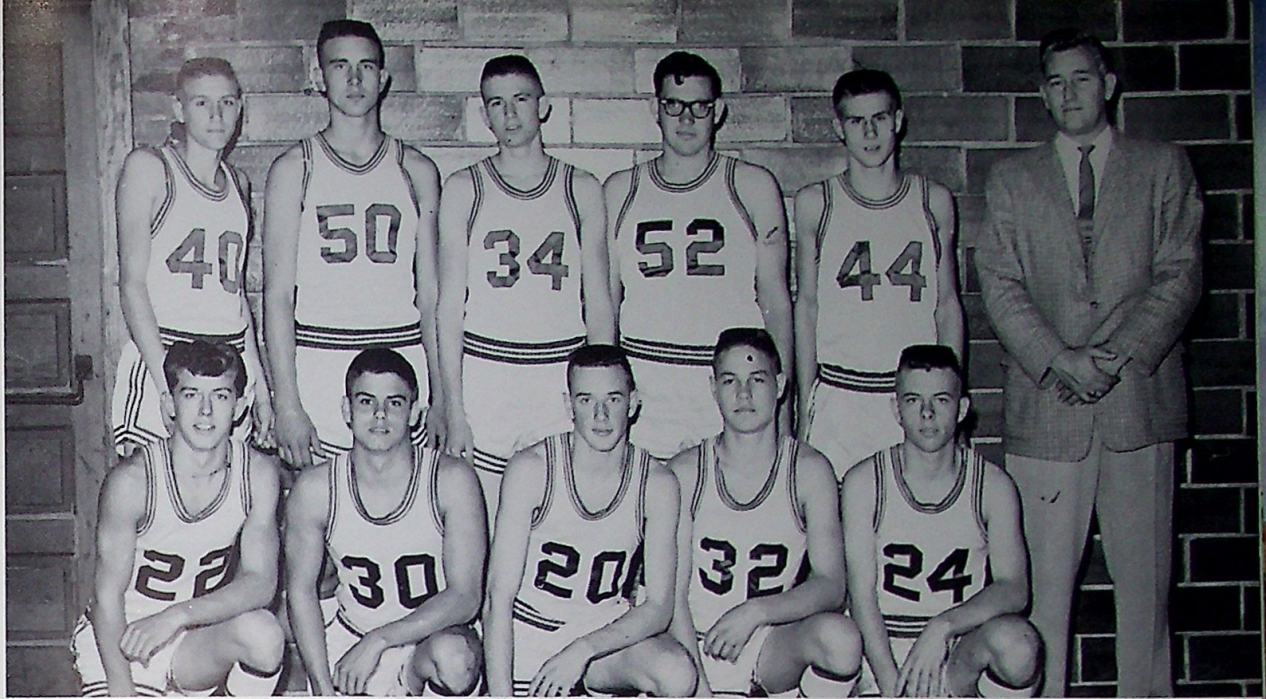

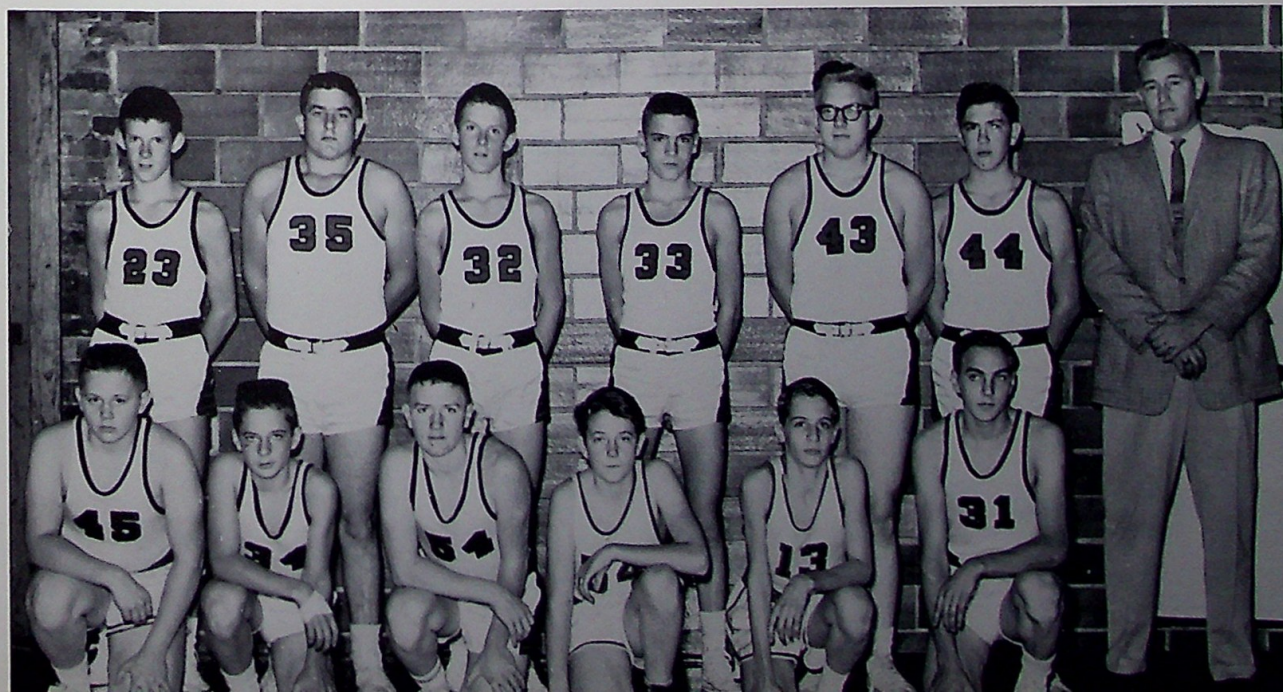

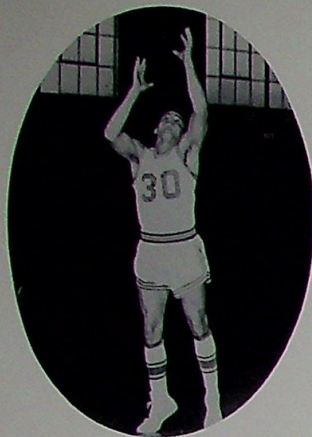


By the look on these boys' faces, we can see that they are proud of their 18-6 record. These are our "Mighty Fighting Panthers" who had a winning season. This is the first year since 1951 that Whitestown has been on top. They were able to defeat arch rival Zionsville whom they had not beaten since 1948. 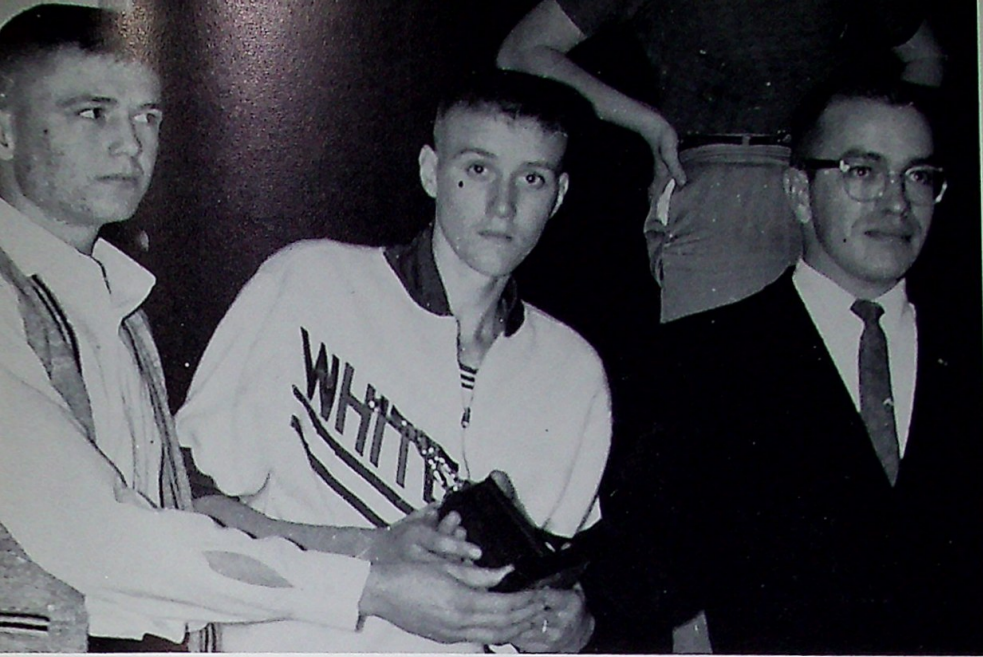

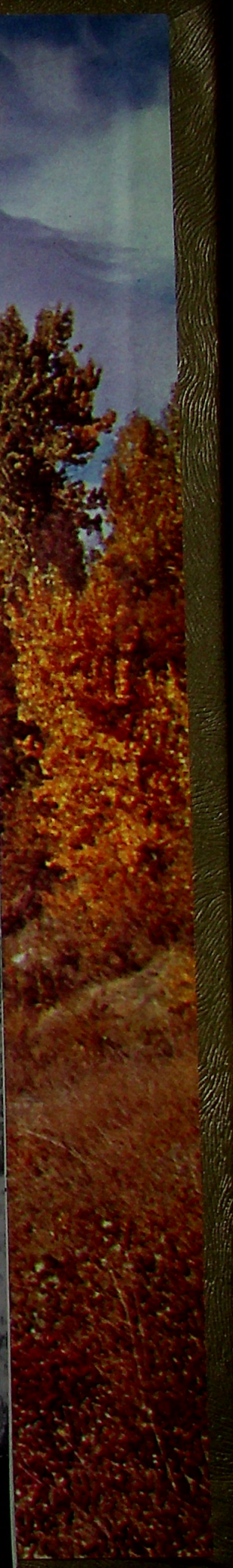
In selecting a senior play, the class decided on a three-act comedy entitled "Goodnight Ladies."
