

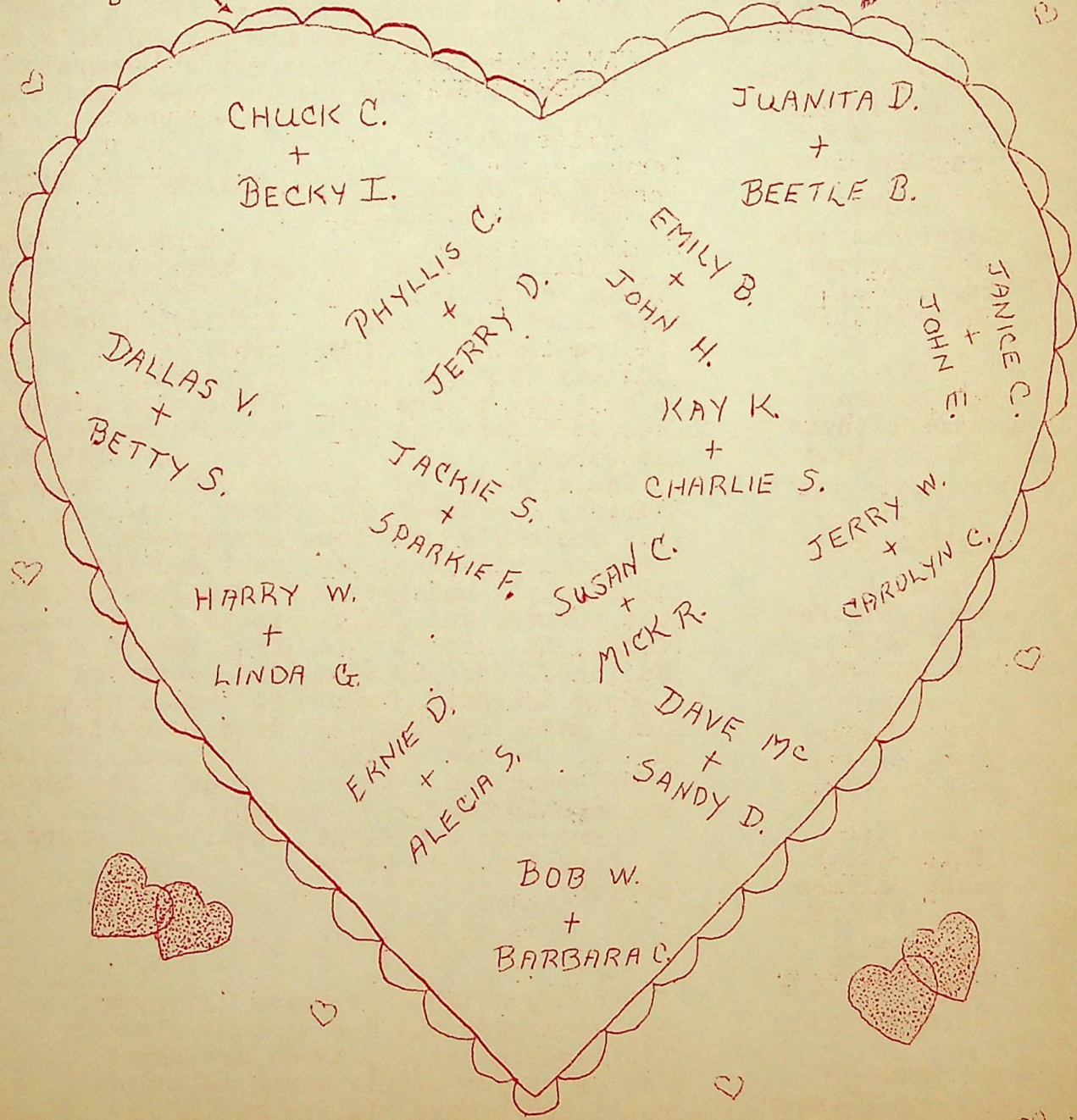
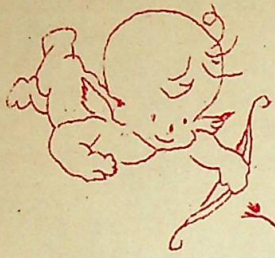

So the day got it's name as the feast day or name day of several of the early Christian martyrs who were named "Valentine".

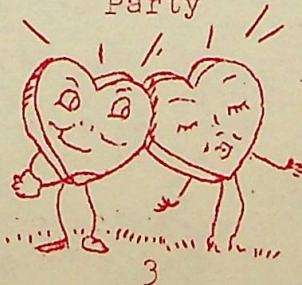
"VALENTINE'S DAY"

WHITESTOWN VS MT. COMFORT WHITESTOWN VS PINNELL PANTHERS STRIKE AGAIN

February 2 found the Panthers roaming their home court once again with one main objective; to gain a victory over Mt. Comfort. The Panthers were hungry for a victory as the half time score showed Whitestown on top 38 to 34. When the battle ceased in the third quarter, however, Whitestown began falling shy of their objective with Mt. Comfort leading 54 to 50.

The teams were evenly matched in the final quarter with Mt. Comfort gaining a slight advantage. When the smoke cleared, the score was found to be Mt. Comfort 71, Whitestown 61. High for Whitestown was Stultz with 29 counters followed by Walker, Pierce, and Allen with 6 each. High for Mt. Comfort was Sparks with 29, followed by Heller with 14 points.

The B-team again proved themselves capable of being the better of the two by winning their second game in a row defeating Mt. Comfort 33-29. Again their movement on offense made the difference. High for Whitestown was Barton with 16, followed by Dickerson with 12.

On January 25 Pinnell journeyed to Whitestown to play their home game on the Whitestown court. When the final gun sounded, the Purple Dragons were on top by a margin of 70 to 54. It was a hard fought ballgame on the boards with Pinnell having a height advantage. At the end of the second quarter, the score was tied at 28 all. When the third quarter halted the Panthers were still in the game being down only two points. The final eight minutes was all that was needed by Pinnell to gain the victory by out-scoring Whitestown by 14 points. High for Whitestown was Stultz with 19, followed by Dickerson with 16.

Players in double figures for Pinnell were Anderson, Dinsmore, and Stokler, with 25, 23, and 15 points, respectively.

The B-team faired better than the varsity by defeating the Pinnell squad, 38 to 32.

In the contest preceding the varsity game the B-team showed much more movement on offense than they did in previous games and it proved to make the difference.

Leading the way in scoring was Barton with 13, followed by Baker with 14 counters.

Whitestown used a full court press in the fourth quarter to move from a five point deficit to a two point victory. The press forced Deaf School into several mistakes and Whitestown was able on a few occasions to do some ball stealing.

Deaf School took a 13-9 first quarter lead and increased its margin by intermission time to 30-18.

The Panthers began to move up in the third period, scoring 16 points to Deaf School's 9 and go into the fourth quarter down only by a 39-34 count.

The 20-13 spread in the score in the fourth quarter with Whitestown holding the top score, proved the difference in the final count.

The Panthers were down by as much as 20 points in one point of the game.

Pacing the Whitestown attack was Ernie Dickerson with 14 points. Allen finished with ten counters.

DOES HE LOVE YOU ??

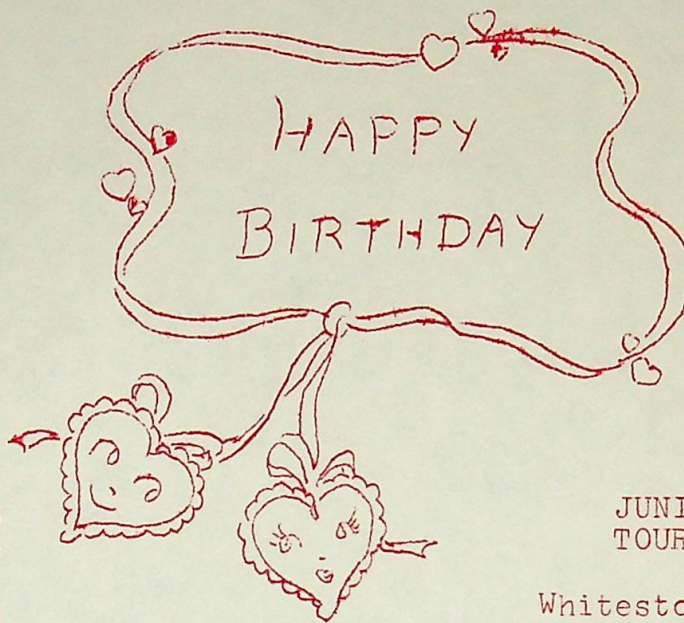
If you receive a 15 cent Valentine card you can be sure it is only friendship, while less than a 15 cent card could be considered an insult.
