There will be no regular business meeting Wednesday.

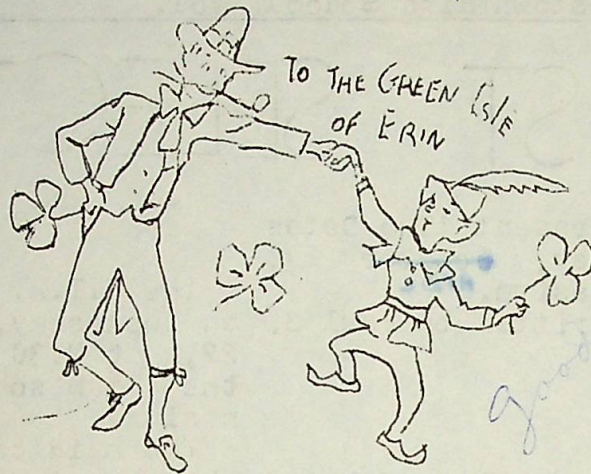

Both of the Whitestown teams got into the action early as the Varsity played Thorntown in the second game of the Zionsville Sectional, and the Junior High kicked off their own tourney against Zionsville Junior High in the opening game.
