HONOR ROLL REQUIREMENTS

There will be two levels on the honor roll. These will be designated by high and low honor roll. The qualifications are as follows:

High Honor Roll - To belong to the high honor roll, a student must have at least 3 A's in solid subjects, have no grade lower than a B, in all subjects and a B in conduct.

SENIOR HIGH ATHLETIC REQUIREMENTS

Any boy or girl who represents Whitestown High School in athletics or as cheer-leader must maintain a grade in conduct no lower than "C". They must also pass in at least three solid subjects and have no grade lower than a "D" in any two subjects.

JUNIOR HIGH ATHLETIC REQUIREMENTS

A student must not receive more than one "F" each grading period and a grade of "C" or higher must be maintained in conduct.
