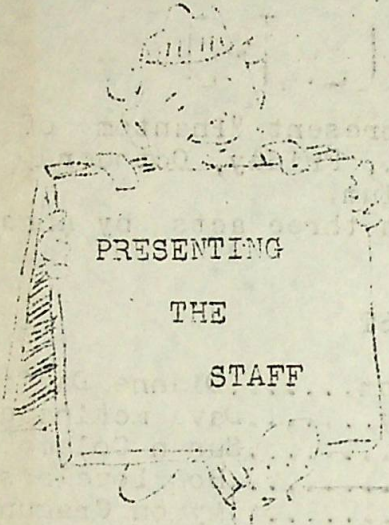
SENIORS MAKE HISTORY
