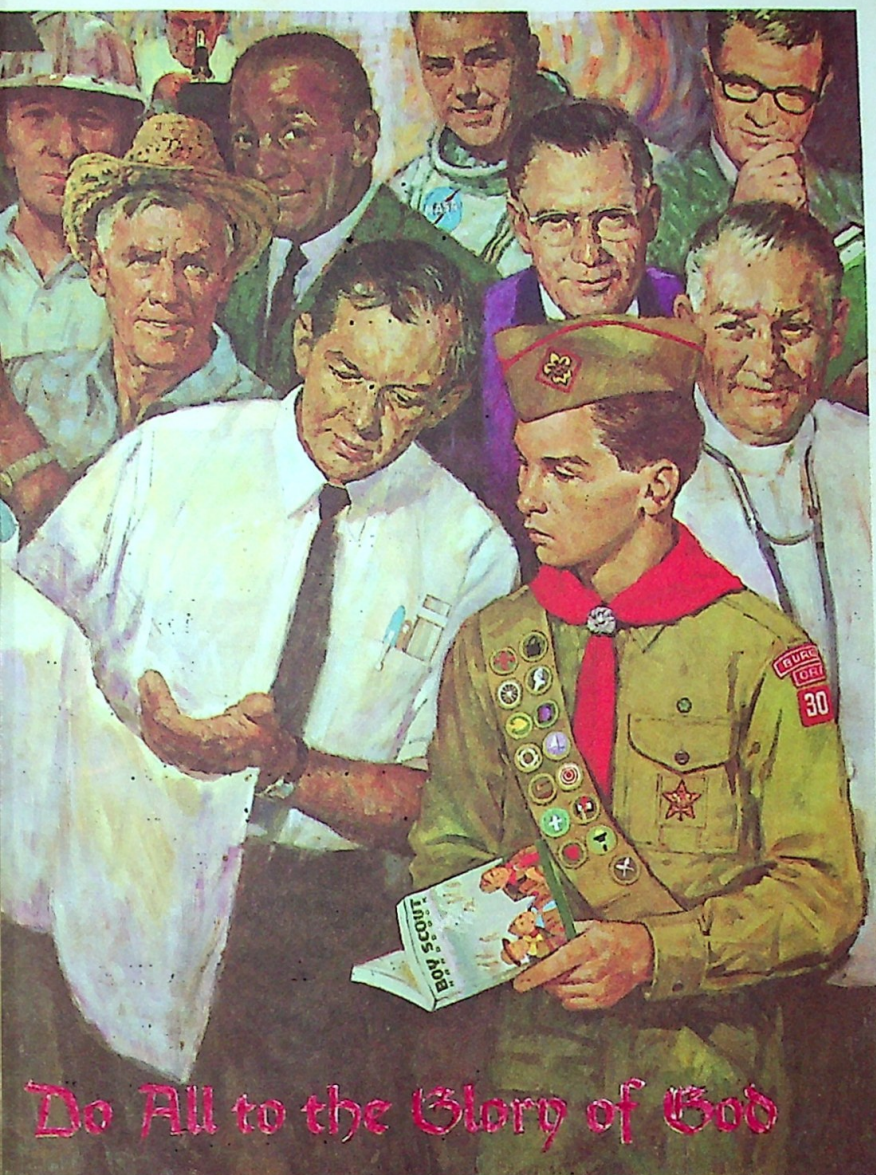

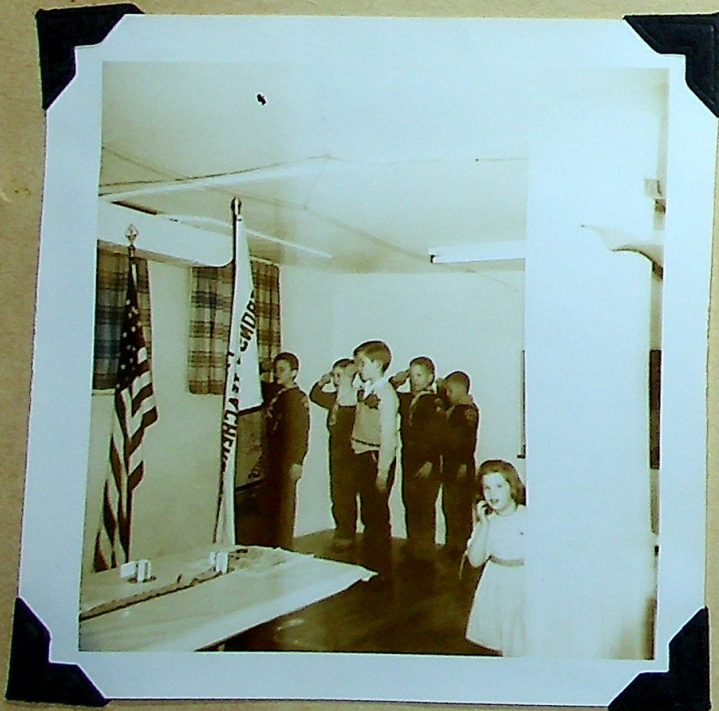

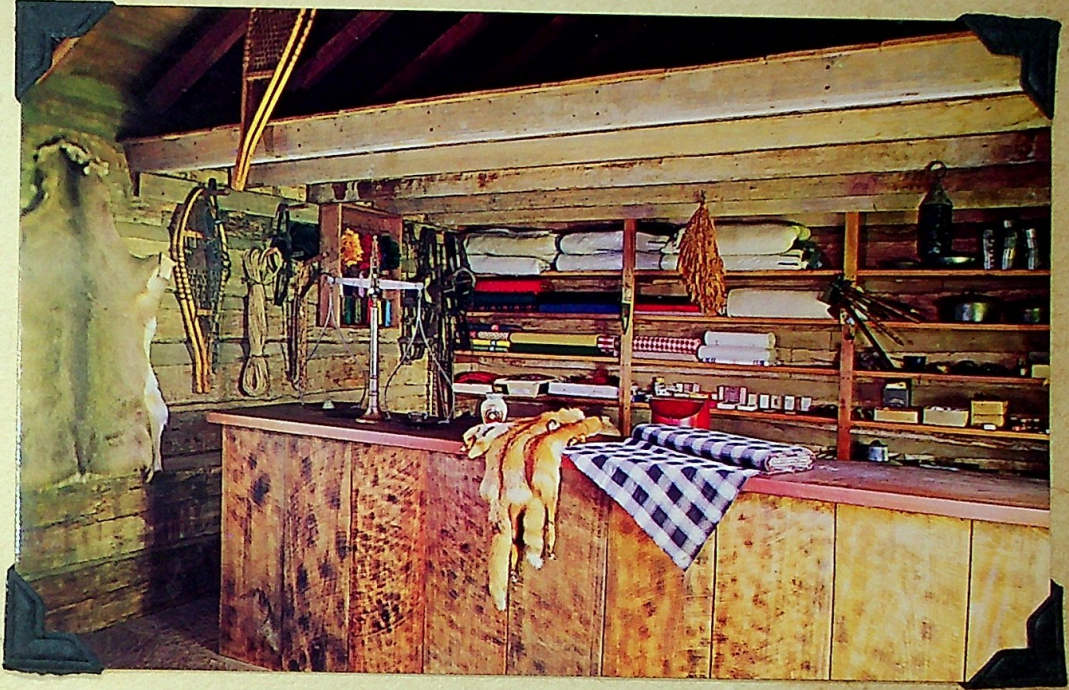

RELIGIOUS PROGRAMS FOR SCOUTING

The Boy Scouts of America is strongly religious in its principles and purposes. It recognizes that religious instruction of a boy in Scouting is the responsibility of the home and the church, synagogue, or other religious association with which a boy is connected.

To help Scouts do their "duty to God" be "reverent" and be "faithful in their religious duties," religious institutions of all faiths have created religious programs with distinctive emblems. Boys are encouraged to enroll in these programs whether members of a civic-, school-, or church-sponsored Scout unit.

In these programs a Scout receives instruction from his own minister, priest, rabbi, ward bishop, or other religious counselor. When he has completed the course of instruction and service projects, the boy receives an emblem of recognition from his own religious institution.

Religious emphasis is an important part of the Breakthrough for Youth program of the Boy Scouts of America. During this year churches and synagogues that now sponsor over half of all Scout units are urged to organize more Cub Scout packs, Boy Scout troops, and Explorer posts as a part of their religious education program.



Ad Altare Dei from opening prayer at holy Mass reminds the Scout of Catholic faith that living close to the altar of God brings him joy.



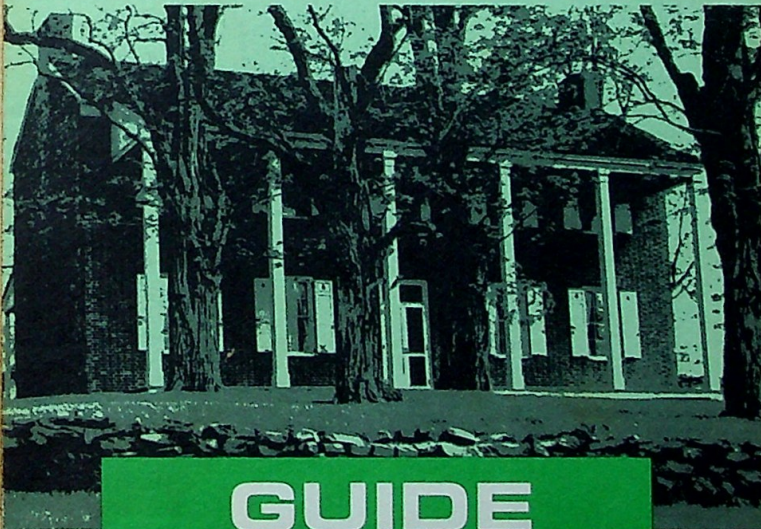
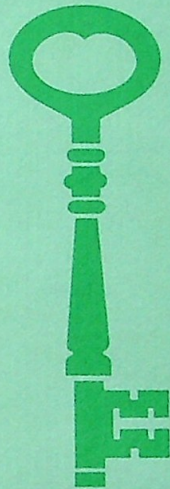
The God and Country program is for boys of Protestant faith. Its emblem design is derived from the colorful shields of crusaders.
