discovered Lady buried up to her chest in mud, her head barely above the water's surface.



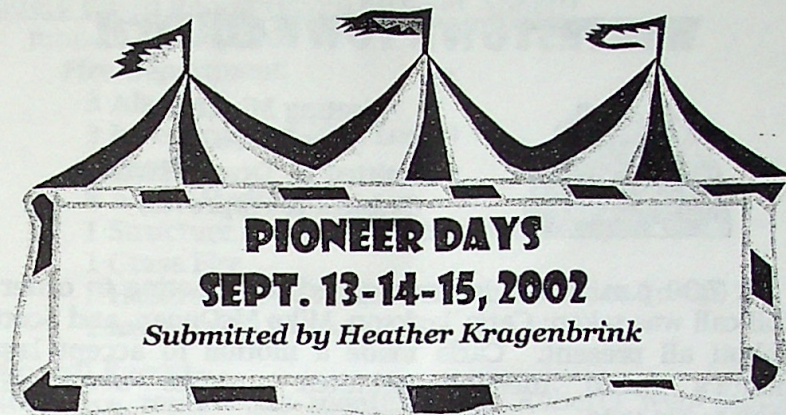

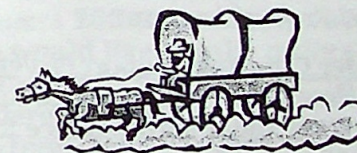

Meeting Minutes
July 8, 2002

At 7:30 p.m., Carla Jackson called the meeting to order. Roll call was taken; Carla Jackson, Mike McQueen, and Scott Abbott all present. Carla made a motion to accept last month's Board meeting minutes. Mike seconded; unanimous vote.

Carla suggested that Kathy call Star Dean to see what she recommends about the ant problem in the pit. If Chris Herrick gives his approval, then Star can do the work. Kathy spoke about the insulation covered and filled inside the pit; the property owners will take care of it. The Smoothreads meter has to be replaced; Chris will order it tomorrow. The town signs are not in yet. Scott is talking with Christine about setting this up. He has spoken with the Fire Department. The tornado signal is fixed; the Fire Department will take care of setting this up.

New Business



Kathy spoke about Brad Rice, who brought in information from the Lebanon Water Department. They use a meter spigot (made by EJ Prescott) to gauge the amount of water used for outdoor watering or pool fills. Lebanon charges customers \$60 to purchase one of the meters. Carla said she would like to take orders for these, as opposed to ordering too many. In addition to the ones ordered, she suggested having three or four extra meters. Carla asked Kathy to check around to see if there is any interest in these meters. She will check the price and let Carla know before ordering.



Notice of Benefits: Firestone vs. Railroad

We can purchase the property in front of the Sewer Plant (half of the railroad adjacent to our property) for \$431.25. We are still trying to work with the Careys about leasing this property (0.14 acres). Mike made a motion to suspend the normal procedures to purchase this property, because of the emergency nature. Scott seconded; unanimous vote. Motion passed.

Carla asked whether we need to purchase the Wyman property around the Sewer Plant. We are signing a contract with the Careys tonight. The appraisal of the Carey property is \$15,000. We pay \$200 per year and cannot increase more than 5 percent.

Carla explained her concerns; Mike explained his concerns. The easement is the topic — how much the sewer line needs. Mike feels we need to incur the drive. Carla meets with Jim from Triad Wednesday to find out how much we need. Carla asked Christine to put a right of first refusal on this contract, which will be recorded in the Boone County Courthouse; Christine will do this. He will never be able to build on this property (it is land locked). Carla said we are putting the Wyman property on hold (Sewer Plant to Jackson Run).

Mike made a motion to vote on signing a 2002 lease for the Carey property. Scott seconded; unanimous vote. Motion passed.

Mike spoke about the Lions Club drive; we do not show this on any of our maps. Mike made a motion for someone to prove this property is in the town; Carla said for them to prove this is a road. There is a rock in the center of this drive. Dave Fitch feels the town owns the drive; he wants to know if his back lot is accessible. Christine spoke to Doug from Triad; he said the town corporate line goes at an angle through the park drive. If we have the documents and give them to Doug, he will give us the answer. We need the property legal survey for the park and the property to the north. Carla asked Dave to fax the copies to Christine. Christine asked Dave for the parcel numbers for the park and his back lot; she will research this. Carla said that if this is Whitestown property, the drive will look much different.

Mike asked Chris Herrick about a storm drain in the park. There is a problem and it needs to be fixed; Chris said to call the Board of Health. Carla said she will call Sam Merrill for more information. Dave Fitch said that he would be happy to pay a sixth of the legal fee to get this information about the park drive.

Star Development

Carla said that Star Development has had several calls of interest; they will be dropping off the packets.

Crossmann Communities

The letter of credit has not yet arrived; they did send a letter saying they will send a letter of credit. Carla will call Mike Andreoli.

John Allen spoke about the streets; they have about a mile of street ready for stone. The APC refused the building permits for the model homes until the infrastructure is done. Their timetable was pushed back 60 days.

Cumulative Capital Fund

Kathy said we need to send the proof of publication to the Boone County Courthouse.

Town Park

Mike explained the new light poles. They will begin work in August. Chris Herrick said they also want to put poles by the Water Plant; Mike said to ask them to call him.

Carla asked about the Safety Board. Scott said he is looking at more options.

Miscellaneous

Chris Herrick said Valenti-Held is getting ready to do major testing. John Allen will watch; Mike said Norman can help out. Mike said Norman gets paid \$13 an hour; he will ask Norman to speak with Chris.

Ed Krouse asked about the cell tower. Mike said the APC approved a 200-foot monopole. *The Lebanon Reporter* said they wouldn't pursue it due to the cost.

Bud Pipes requested a new meter; Kathy said she has already put in a work order for the meter replacement. Bud spoke about the Lions Club Park drive.

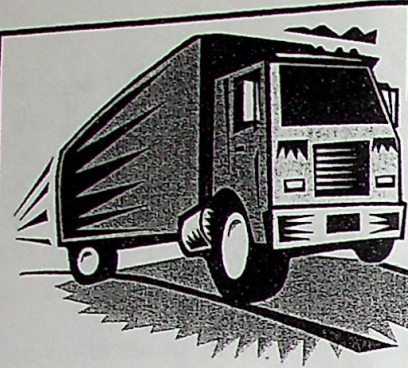
Clerk

Kathy talked about the parking during business hours.

Mike suggested buying Open/Closed signs; Carla agreed.

A town citizen asked, "Who do we call when there is an ammonia leak?" Scott said to call 911 or the Fire Department. Scott is working with them on this. Mike suggested a false alarm fee for the Fire Department. (The Fire Department would have to do this.) The Co-Op has had 60 leaks in 6 years. The false alarm fee in Zionsville is \$25, and goes up \$25 for each violation.

Carla made a motion to close the meeting after the signing of the claims. Mike seconded; unanimous vote. Motion passed.



ORDINANCE 2001-08:

WHEREAS, the Town of Whitestown has established Traffic Regulations for Commercial Vehicles to promote the orderly flow of traffic within the corporate boundaries of Whitestown (hereinafter referred to as the "Town") pursuant to Title 7, Article XV; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council recognizes that it is in the best interests of the Town to protect the integrity of the municipal streets by amending Title 7, Article XV, to include the following weight restrictions and truck routes for commercial vehicles;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE WHITESTOWN TOWN COUNCIL, WHITESTOWN, INDIANA, that:

Title 7, Article XV of the Town Code shall be amended by the addition thereto of the following Sections 2 through 4.

Section 2: Weight Restrictions

When signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall operate a commercial vehicle exceeding Eleven Thousand pounds gross weight upon any municipal side street nor shall any person operate a commercial vehicle exceeding Twenty-Six Thousand pounds gross weight on CR 300 South or on CR 650 East within the corporate limits of Whitestown except as provided under Section 3.

Section 3: Commercial Vehicle

(A) **COMMERCIAL VEHICLES PROHIBITED FROM USING CERTAIN STREETS.** When signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall operate a commercial vehicle exceeding Eleven Thousand pounds gross weight upon any municipal side street or part thereof nor shall any person operate a commercial vehicle exceeding Twenty-Six Thousand pounds gross weight on CR 300 South or CR 650 East within the corporate limits of Whitestown, except that such commercial vehicles may be operated thereon for the purpose of delivering or picking up materials or merchandise locally and then only by entering such street at the intersection nearest the destination of the vehicle and proceeding thereon no further than the nearest intersection thereafter.

(B) **PENALTIES AND PROCEDURES.** Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction punishable by a fine of not more than:

First Offense:	Up to \$250
Second Offense:	Up to \$500
Third Offense:	Up to \$1000
Fourth & Subsequent Offenses:	Up to \$2000

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS AND TRUCK ROUTES (AMENDING TITLE 7, ARTICLE XV)

i) The Whitestown Town Court shall be the proper venue and jurisdiction for enforcement of the ordinance. Citations for violation of this ordinance may be issued by the Whitestown Town Marshal or any authorized Deputy or duly sworn reserve officer. Persons charged with a violation under this Article shall be given appropriate notice of such charge by personal service or by placing said notice in or upon a vehicle parked or stopped in violation of any provision hereof. Any person so charged may appear at the office of the Clerk-Treasurer within forty-eight (48) hours of the issuance of notice and make payment to the Whitestown Clerk-Treasurer of the penalty and fine set out in Section 3 (B) above, as same may be amended from time to time. Payment of the fine shall be an acknowledgment of such violation and offense. If in the opinion of the Town Marshal or any duly authorized Deputy, any person charged with violating this Article is about to leave the jurisdiction, such officer may institute action forthwith before a court of law, magistrate or judge for the collection of such fine or penalty.

ii) Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to limit any other rights or actions that may exist in law or equity.

iii) If any portion of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not effect the remaining portions of this ordinance so long as enforcement of same can be given the intended effect.

iv) All monies collected pursuant to a violation of this ordinance shall be deposited by the Clerk-Treasurer in the Whitestown Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

Section 4: Truck Route

When signs are erected giving notice thereof, any person operating a commercial vehicle exceeding thirteen (13) tons gross weight shall utilize the following truck route in and around the corporate limits of the Town of Whitestown, except as provided under Section 3:

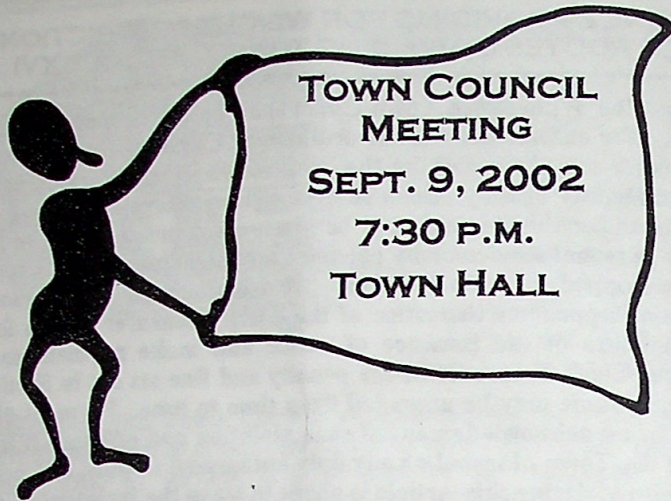
South-North commercial vehicles exceeding the aforementioned weight limits shall use I-65 or SR 421.

East-West commercial vehicles exceeding the posted weight limit shall use SR 334 or SR 32.

THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL, RECORDING, AND PUBLICATION AS PROVIDED BY LAW.

PASSED AND ADOPTED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF WHITESTOWN THIS 9th DAY OF APRIL, 2001.

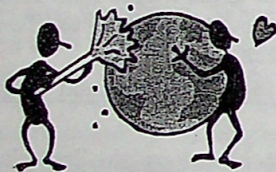

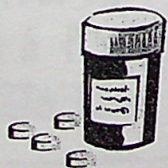

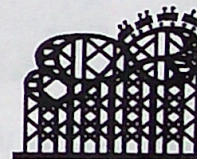

BEGINNINGS

In 1851, the Indiana General Assembly passed an act "to encourage agriculture," which also included the formation of a State Board of Agriculture. The primary goal of the Board was to create the first Indiana State Fair.

In 1852, Indiana became the 6th state to begin holding a state agricultural fair. The first Fair, held in what is now Military Park in downtown Indianapolis, was an amazing success. It was a landmark in the

Agricultural history of Indiana. The Fair was held in response to the aspirations of Governor J.A. Wright and others who believed that, "to make two blades of grass grow where one had formerly grown, to increase the crop yields, to preserve the soil fertility was a very worthy thing and almost a sacred duty."

The State Fair has been located in Indianapolis for the majority of its existence, but other Indiana cities hosted the event in the 1800's. Lafayette (1853), Madison (1854), New Albany (1859), Fort Wayne (1865), and Terre Haute (1867) hosted the Fair before it was moved to Voss Farm in Indianapolis. The gates opened at the Indiana State Fairgrounds on East 38th Street for the first time on September 19, 1892.

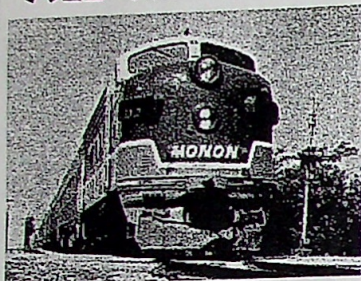

COMING IN 2005: THE NEW SAT

In March 2005, the new SAT will be given for the first time.

- The former SAT Verbal Exam will become the SAT Critical Reading Exam. The test will no longer include analogies! Instead, short reading sections will be added to existing long reading passages.
- A new section called the SAT Writing Exam will be added. This section will contain multiple-choice grammar questions as well as a written essay.
- The SAT Math Exam will be expanded to cover three years of high school math. Instead of just covering concepts from Geometry and Algebra I, the new SAT Math Exam will contain concepts from Geometry, Algebra I and Algebra II.

In light of these changes, college-bound students may wish to rethink their high school math and writing course selections.

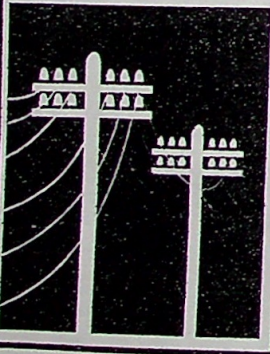

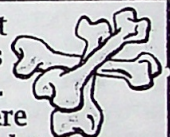

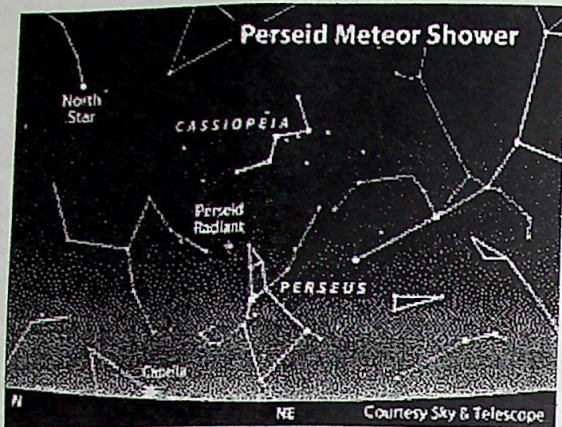

PERSEID METEOR SHOWER

The thin crescent Moon sets early on the evening of August 12, leaving the sky fully dark for this year's Perseid meteor shower. The display should peak later that night for observers throughout the Northern Hemisphere, especially as morning twilight begins. That's when the radiant (the patch of sky between Perseus and Cassiopeia from which the Perseids appear to come) is highest in midnorthern latitudes. Skywatchers can expect to see 60 or more Perseids per hour, provided the sky is very clear and dark.

If you miss the Perseids that night, all is not lost. The shower lasts for two weeks or so, with excellent rates in the predawn hours of August 10 through 15. Far fewer meteors will appear before midnight, even on the night of the shower's maximum, because the radiant is then quite low in the sky.

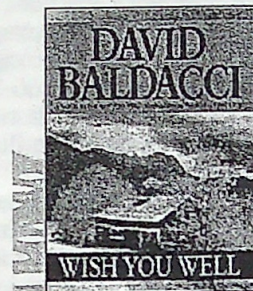

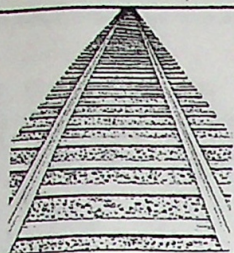

Sweaty-sticky-stinky-hot dog days of August; summer's dragging on as usual. Kids are counting the days; can hardly wait for school to start. Well, at least that's the way it was in post-World War II Whitestown. Surely, that hasn't changed? You read right; in the late 1940s, all the kids I knew loved school. Honest. Cross my eyes ... uh ... uh ... heart.

Yesiree-bob, learning was our business. We had a motto, "We Yearn To Learn!" And learn we did. We learned how to entertain ourselves; had to, there was no fancy community swimming pool, or air-conditioned Boys/Girls Club, or summer camp, etc. So, with the first day of school weeks away, what did we do to occupy our time?

We spent a lot of time hanging around the Big Four Railroad Depot, watching the station agent work the teletype and waiting for a mail train to fly by. That depot, which was a half-block east of the Main Street rail crossing, fascinated kids; and we were always welcome there. To say that the mail trains would "fly" through town is accurate. We learned that most rolled through at 60-70 miles-an-hour. And there was a faster train yet; the sleek James Whitcomb Riley passenger train. It breezed through at 80-85 miles-an-hour. Needless to say, that was a daily attraction for us kids.

A train going through the center of town - where there were only flashing red lights to warn pedestrians and motorists (no automated crossing gates with clanging bells like today) - that fast would leave one wondering about the accident rate, how many people were hit and killed every year. Believe it or not, at that busy crossing, none that I've ever heard about. A passenger train did hit a car at the other rail crossing on the west side of town one night in the late 40s. The car was demolished but no one was hurt. Point being, people had a great deal of respect for trains; they could hurt you real bad. One of the first things kids were taught back then was to watch out for trains - not to never venture near the railroad tracks; just watch for trains and get out of their way.

So, what was so interesting about a mail train coming through town? Two things: An outgoing mailbag hung from a steel pipe apparatus alongside one of the two main rail lines (there were also two rail sidings, so the New York Central Railroad facilities occupied a large area of downtown). As the train flew past, a steel rod jutting from the mail car (a post office on wheels; every passenger train had one) hit the mailbag dead center and the mail car attendant standing in an open doorway cranked it in. A split-

second later, as the mail car cleared the crossing, he kicked out a sack or two of incoming mail. That was the highlight for us; seeing those mailbags hit the ground and bounce along the tracks for about 50 feet.

There was always the suspense factor; would those mailbags clear of the tracks? Always did when I was watching. But one time, a bag didn't get the proper launching, dropped straight down and was ripped to shreds by the train's wheels. Mail flew all over the place, it was said.

Actually, the railroad was a favorite place for kids to play - in Whitestown, at least. Another pastime was chasing rats back and forth along the steel rails. Once a kid got the hang of it and learned the rats always hugged the rail and never turn on you, he indulged in the sport of rocking rats. Besides just chasing them, you threw rocks at them until they either outran you or you scored a direct hit and knocked out the rat. And there was no shortage of rats. We played that sport alongside the big grain elevator (yeh, it's gone, too) where spillage from loading boxcars attracted the varmints.

Other times, we climbed up into the elevator cob bin and roughhoused. Ah, nothing like a good ol' corncob fight. Kind of like those sponge balls kids throw around today; getting hit in the head with a corncob didn't hurt. That was a pretty exhausting pastime, though, especially in July and August. You could have baked a cake in that metal cob bin; the sweat rolled, stirring up the cobs sent flaky stuff (kind of like sawdust) into the air and that stuck to sweaty skin. It also got into your mouth and eyes and went up your nose.

That was the last straw; then you could barely breathe and it was time to find something else to do. Something refreshing, and that meant dashing off to the town pump, a fixture for decades in front of the post office on Main Street. Besides pumping yourself a drink (you worked the iron handle with one hand and cupped the other under the spout to hold back the water; then you bent over, slightly loosened your hold on the spout and treated yourself to a cool, clear, tasty drink of water), we blocked the spout and pumped up enough pressure to shoot a stream of water 10 to 15 feet - on each other, of course.



Then for real refreshment, we went to Allen's Standard Station for a cold 12-ounce glass bottle of Pepsi-Cola and a bag of Planter's peanuts. That cost you all of 10 cents. But you didn't just chew on peanuts and then take a swig of Pepsi, etc. After one big swig of Pepsi to make room for the peanuts, you poured all the peanuts into the bottle and then enjoyed the whole enchilada. It was a meal in itself but you didn't realize that until you went home for lunch or dinner and couldn't eat a bite.

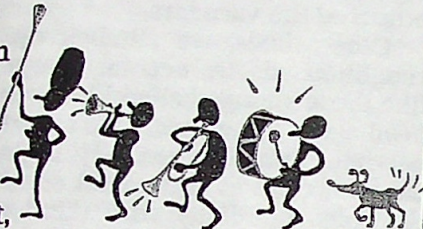

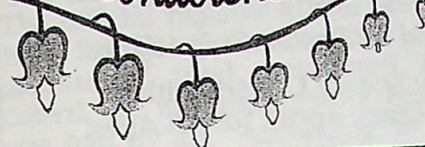

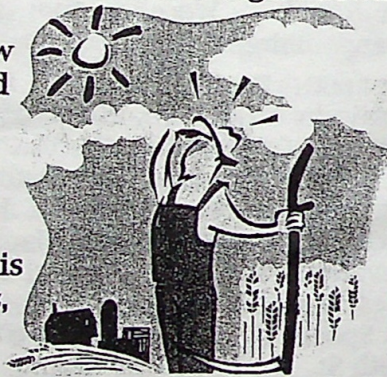
Perhaps I'm horticulturally challenged, but I find it fascinating that a farmer can spread herbicide over an entire field, and it will only kill the weeds, not the beans or corn. It's almost as if the herbicide knows the difference between the weeds and the farmer's crop.

With regards to the growing season, Jesus used many parables in explaining what the kingdom of Heaven is like. One particular parable is found in Matthew 13, verses 24-30. 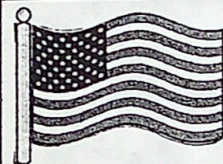

Pledge of Allegiance Ruled Unconstitutional



On June 26, 2002, a three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit ruled 2 to 1 that the Pledge of Allegiance is unconstitutional, because it describes the United States as "one Nation, under God." If the ruling is allowed to stand, schoolchildren could no longer recite the pledge, at least in the nine western states covered by the court (Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon and Washington).

President Eisenhower alluded to the religious aspects of the pledge on June 14, 1954, when he signed the insertion of the phrase "under God" into law. "Millions of our school children will daily proclaim in every city and town, every village and rural schoolhouse, the dedication of our nation and our people to the Almighty," Eisenhower said.

- At least 1 dose of Haemophilus Influenza (HIB)

Vaccines for college students (meningococcal, hepatitis B & tetanus) are also available. The polysaccharide meningococcal vaccine is recommended by the American College Health Association, as college students in dormitories face an increased risk for bacterial meningitis. Please call ahead to order the vaccine, which is available for \$70.27.

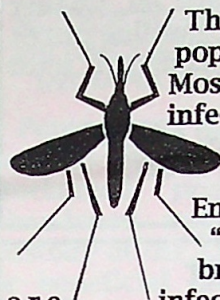

WEST NILE VIRUS



The West Nile Virus is harbored in wild bird populations (especially blue jays and crows). Mosquitoes transmit the disease between infected birds and other species. When humans or horses contract the virus, it can cause the disease encephalitis. Encephalitis (also known as "brain fever" or "sleeping sickness") is a disease of the brain. Onset is usually sudden. Most who are infected by the West Nile Virus have no symptoms (or only mild, flu-like symptoms, which appear 3-15 days after the bite of an infected mosquito). More severe infection is common in adults over 50 or those who are in poor health, and may be marked by high fever, headache, stupor, nausea, vomiting, stiff neck, and dizziness. Drowsiness progressing into a coma, muscular twitching and convulsions may also occur. The disease is not spread between humans and there is no vaccine for West Nile encephalitis.

Personal Protection Measures

- Avoid outdoor activities between dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are likely to be biting.
- If you must be outdoors when mosquitoes are active, cover up by wearing shoes, socks, long pants and long-sleeved shirts. Light colors are less attractive to mosquitoes.
- Use mosquito repellent. Repellents that contain diethyl toluamide (DEET) as the active ingredient work best. Low concentrations should be used on children.
- Clear your property of potential mosquito breeding sites like plastic or ceramic containers, and old tires. Clear clogged gutters, and repair malfunctioning septic systems.

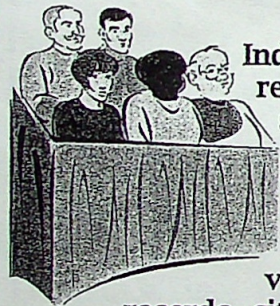

JURY DUTY

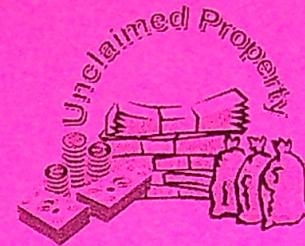


Indiana currently relies solely on voter registration lists for prospective juror selection. Effective January 1, 2003, Indiana counties will be required to supplement the voter registration list with at least one secondary source, such as utility customer lists, tax rolls, vehicle registration and driver's license

records, city directories, telephone directories, or income tax returns.

To qualify for jury duty, a person must be a U.S. citizen 18 years or older, reside in the summoning county, and be able to read, write, speak and understand English.

As Indiana Supreme Court Chief Justice Randall Shepard explains, "The idea has always been to cast a net to cover the broadest section of society as you possibly can."
