# WHITESTOWN TOWN COUNCIL



Meeting Minutes  
June 9, 2003  
Submitted by Deana Harter

At 7:30 p.m., the meeting was called to order by Scott Abbott. Roll call was taken by Kathy Graham; all Board members were present.

Reading and approval of minutes. Carla made the motion to accept the May Board meeting minutes. Mike seconded; unanimous vote ensued.

## NEW BUSINESS

Purchase of Building: Carla said the Township intends to sell this building. The appraisal came in at \$75,000, and that is what they are asking. We have 14 days to decide what to do. Mike spoke about how he feels about purchasing this building. Estelle Albright spoke her opinion about the Town building. Jerre Albright spoke about getting a trailer for the Town office and leaving the other Town building for the police. Ralph has spoken to Larry Averitt about using the old post office as a police department. Questions were raised about Tony-someone trying to rezone the post office. Tom from Triad will check into the zoning of the old building and whether it has been listed as a historical building. Discussion of what needs to be done to the old building. This fall, we will have five years to build on the acreage Crossmann has designated to the Town as municipal land.

Carla made the motion to not purchase the building. Mike seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued. Kathy will call Rob Guest Tuesday (tomorrow) to let him know. We do need to know how long we will be allowed to stay here.

Tom said we could have a building like we are talking about built in six months. Tom said we are looking at \$80-\$100 per square foot for a municipal building. They discussed putting the Town records in storage.

Carla asked Kathy to check into who owns the old school building to see if we may be able to rent something in that building. Kathy was told to inquire about an office with about 600 square foot.

Town Clean-Up: Scott discussed the requests for Town Clean-Up day. The 12th of July was the date discussed, from 8:00 until 12:00.

Holey Moley: \$600 the first year, \$400 every year after that. This is mandatory now, so we have to join. Mike made the motion we join Holey Moley. Scott seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued. Estelle asked about the Holey Moley issue: What are we going to do? The Board repeated the previous paragraph. Tom Schubert from Triad explained what Holey Moley does.

Executive Session: Carla would like to have an Executive Session this Friday with the Board and Chris Herrick only from 4:30-5:00 to discuss employee issues.

Carla had to leave.

## OLD BUSINESS

Trees and Sidewalks: Mike has spoken to two towns; they split the cost 50-50. If the curb and sidewalk are against the street, it is the Town's issue. If there is grass between the sidewalk and the street, it is the homeowner's issue. Danville and Lebanon both do it this way. Mike will get ideas of how a few more towns do this. Mike still needs to get something on paper. Mike explained the tree responsibility.

Ordinance 2003-06: Kathy read Ordinance 2003-06, Sick Leave/Vacations and Holiday Pay (second reading). Scott made the motion to pass Ordinance 2003-06 on the second reading and waive the third reading. Mike seconded. Estelle interrupted, asking about the anniversary date. She feels this needs to be addressed. Mike and Scott asked Christine about changing the wording. Estelle answered. Mike stated the motion has been made and seconded. Unanimous vote by Scott and Mike to pass Ordinance 2003-06. Christine will make the changes.

Ordinance 2003-07: Mike read Ordinance 2003-07, Ordinance Vacating Undeveloped Platted Roads and Panther Memorial Park (third reading). Mike made the motion to pass Ordinance 2003-07. Scott seconded the motion. Mike and Scott voted to pass Ordinance 2003-07. Motion passed.

Ordinance 2003-08: Scott read Ordinance 2003-08, An Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance of Whitestown Concerning Development Plan Regulations (first reading). Estelle asked for a copy of this ordinance.

Ordinance 2003-09: Mike read Ordinance 2003-09, An Amendment to the Subdivision Control Ordinance of Whitestown Concerning Minor Plat Exemptions (first reading).

## STAFF REPORTS

### Street Department: John Allen

John said that 10 families have moved in. Crossmann plans to have all of the houses sold in one year. Mike asked about contact with the new people moving in. Bill Walker said Zionsville Welcome Wagon has greeted them. Discussion followed about a Whitestown welcome packet.

Progress of Crossmann Community: 28 Houses, 66 Permits Issued, 51 Houses being worked on

Estelle interrupted about a fence being in the 40-foot buffer zone and another neighbor building a fence. Discussion followed about the Homeowners' Association having rules they need to follow.

One of the new homeowners spoke up; he stated Mr. Albright was trespassing while walking around his neighbor's house taking pictures. He terrified the woman alone in the house. She phoned her husband, who advised her to phone the police. As a homeowner, he doesn't appreciate being harassed. He is asking if the Board can do anything. He doesn't know if the fence is in the wrong.

Christine explained there cannot be any permanent structures in the 40-foot buffer zone. It will be between the homeowner and the contractor to fix this if it is within the 40-foot easement. This is the Town and the County's ordinance.

Estelle said they are in violation; the APC did come out and measure this. They will be sending a letter to the homeowner. The audience disputed this issue in a heated tone.

Kathy will call Terri from the APC to talk about the fence issue.

Christine explained the contractor needs to fix this. Scott said we will contact Crossmann to see if they can include the fence buffer zone information for the homeowners.

### Marshal: Ralph Roberts

Ralph asked questions about the Workmans Comp claim he is filing.

Kathy asked about general bills received for the Police Department. The items purchased were not listed. She needs more information, so she knows where to take the money from to pay the bill.

Scott asked about the new radar gun. Ralph said he hasn't had a chance to check it out yet.

### Water Plant Status: Chris Herrick

Dwight Bergman spoke about the collapsed culvert on his property. He is asking when something will be done. Scott asked Dwight to leave his information and Scott will contact Chris Herrick about this drain and ask Chris to contact Dwight.

Dwight asked about the grass at 608 Pierce. Scott said this is being worked on, as well as another yard in town with tall grass.

Ed also said they have a drainage problem at the Church. Mike said Chris has an answer about this; he is at a class tonight or he could answer this tonight. They stated they would like this on the record that they are here again making a request. They will speak to Chris about this.

They will have an open meeting, Special Session at 5:00 pm. to discuss the drainage issue.

### Park Update: Marta Haza isn't here.

Clerk: Kathy Graham asked about the van out back, it belongs to the Town, but is not plated or registered. Discussion about the van and condition it is in... Scott said he will contact Ralph about getting it out of here. Kathy reminded them that Kathy and Deana will be away for class next week.

Adjournment: Mike made the motion that the June 9<sup>th</sup>, 2003 Whitestown Town Council Meeting be adjourned Scott seconded the motion. Scott and Mike voted to adjourn the meeting. Motion passed.

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Whitestown, Indiana, recognizes that employees may need occasional time off for personal or emergency reasons and that it is in the Town's best interest to accommodate those needs if practicable.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED, that the Town Council of the Town of Whitestown, Indiana (hereinafter referred to as the "Town") hereby amends Title 2, Chapter 2, Section 1, Holiday, Vacation, Leave and Sick Leave, as follows:

#### Short Term Leave of Absence

Occasional time off for personal or emergency reasons may be granted if arranged with the employee's department supervisor as far in advance as possible. Short term leave may be paid only to the extent that the employee has accrued and available paid leave days.

#### Paid Leave

Paid leave shall be covered pursuant to the following general paid leave provision:

All full-time employees shall have 5 working days of paid leave during the first year of employment, 10 days of paid leave after completion of 1 full year of employment, 15 days per year of paid leave after 5 years of employment, and 20 days per year of paid leave after 15 years of employment.

#### Conditions of Paid Leave

1. All employees may take pay in lieu of leave.
2. In no event shall any Town employee be permitted during his/her regularly scheduled leave time to work more than one-half of the total annual allowable leave time in the performance of his/her duties as a Town employee.
3. Eligibility for leave shall be based on the anniversary date, not the calendar date.
4. Any leave or compensation time not taken by the end of the one-year period in which it was earned shall be deemed waived and shall not be banked or carried forward or paid in the form of wages.
5. Leave shall be permitted in one-half day increments, except where the law requires granting intermittent leave.
6. Eligibility for leave shall be based on all prior years of actual service with the Town.
7. Date of hire shall be adjusted if there is a break in employment with the Town.

8. No more than 40 hours of compensation time shall be taken consecutively. No more than 48 hours of compensation time may be banked. An employee shall give his/her supervisor or the department head 48 hours' notice prior to taking compensation time and 2 weeks' notice prior to taking vacation leave.

#### Sick Leave

The Town has eliminated paid "sick leave." To qualify for leave pay, an employee must notify his/her department supervisor/manager of the illness prior to report time on the day of the absence. Employees who do not notify their department supervisor/manager in the above manner shall not be eligible for leave pay.

#### Holidays

Due to the nature of the work required in some departments, holidays may vary. If any regular employee is scheduled to work or render service on a holiday recognized by the Town, he/she shall be compensated according to the Town's overtime policy.

Part-time and seasonal employees shall also be paid for holidays after 5 years of employment. Part-time pay shall be determined based upon the average daily hours worked by said part-time employee during the previous 30-day period.

If any holiday falls on a Sunday, the following Monday shall be the observed holiday, and if said holiday falls on a Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be observed.

Any employee absent without prior authorization on the day preceding and/or following the holiday will not be compensated for the holiday.

Scheduled Holidays: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Day, Presidents Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Day after Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDAINED that all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed and abolished and that this ordinance shall take effect upon its approval, adoption and publication by the Town Council.

ORDINANCE VACATING UNDEVELOPED PLATTED

NO. 2003-07  
ROAD AND ALLEYS IN PANTHER MEMORIAL PARK

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Whitestown ("Town") has determined that it is in the best interests of the Town to vacate certain undeveloped platted and unplatted road and alleys within Panther Memorial Park as depicted in the legal description and survey incorporated herein and attached hereto as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, the Town is the fee simple owner of the Panther Memorial Park; and

WHEREAS, the Whitestown Department of Parks and Recreation through its President, Marta Haza, filed a Petition to vacate the aforementioned public ways; and

WHEREAS, the Town Clerk-Treasurer published notice of the Petition to Vacate Undeveloped Road and Alleys in Panther Memorial Park pursuant to I.C. 36-7-3-12 and I.C. 5-3-1, and sent notice by certified mail to all landowners whose property abuts that portion of the public ways which the Town seeks to vacate; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council held a hearing on the Petition to Vacate Undeveloped Road and Alleys in Panther Memorial Park within thirty (30) days after receipt of the Petition, at which time all aggrieved or interested persons were given an opportunity to be heard;

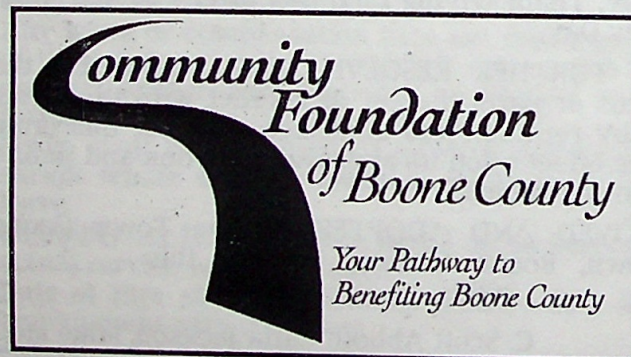
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Whitestown, Indiana, that the following public road and alleys within Panther Memorial Park are hereby vacated:

- The platted and undeveloped portion of Neese Street, having a 50-foot right-of-way as it intersects with the western boundary of Buck Street and proceeds west approximately 120 linear feet to where it intersects with an undeveloped platted north-south alley.
- The platted and undeveloped 16.5-foot alley as it intersects with the western boundary of Buck Street, approximately 120 linear feet south of the undeveloped platted portion of Neese Street and proceeds west approximately 120 linear feet to where it intersects with an undeveloped platted north-south alley.
- The platted and undeveloped alley that commences approximately 120 feet west of the southwest corner of Panther Memorial Park and consists of a strip of land approximately 16.5 feet in width east-to-west and approximately 364.51 feet in length north-to-south.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDAINED that all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed and abolished and that this ordinance shall take effect upon its approval, adoption and publication by the Town Council.

"I would like to see still more alums attend," Cline said. "Get together with friends and classmates, and relive good times."

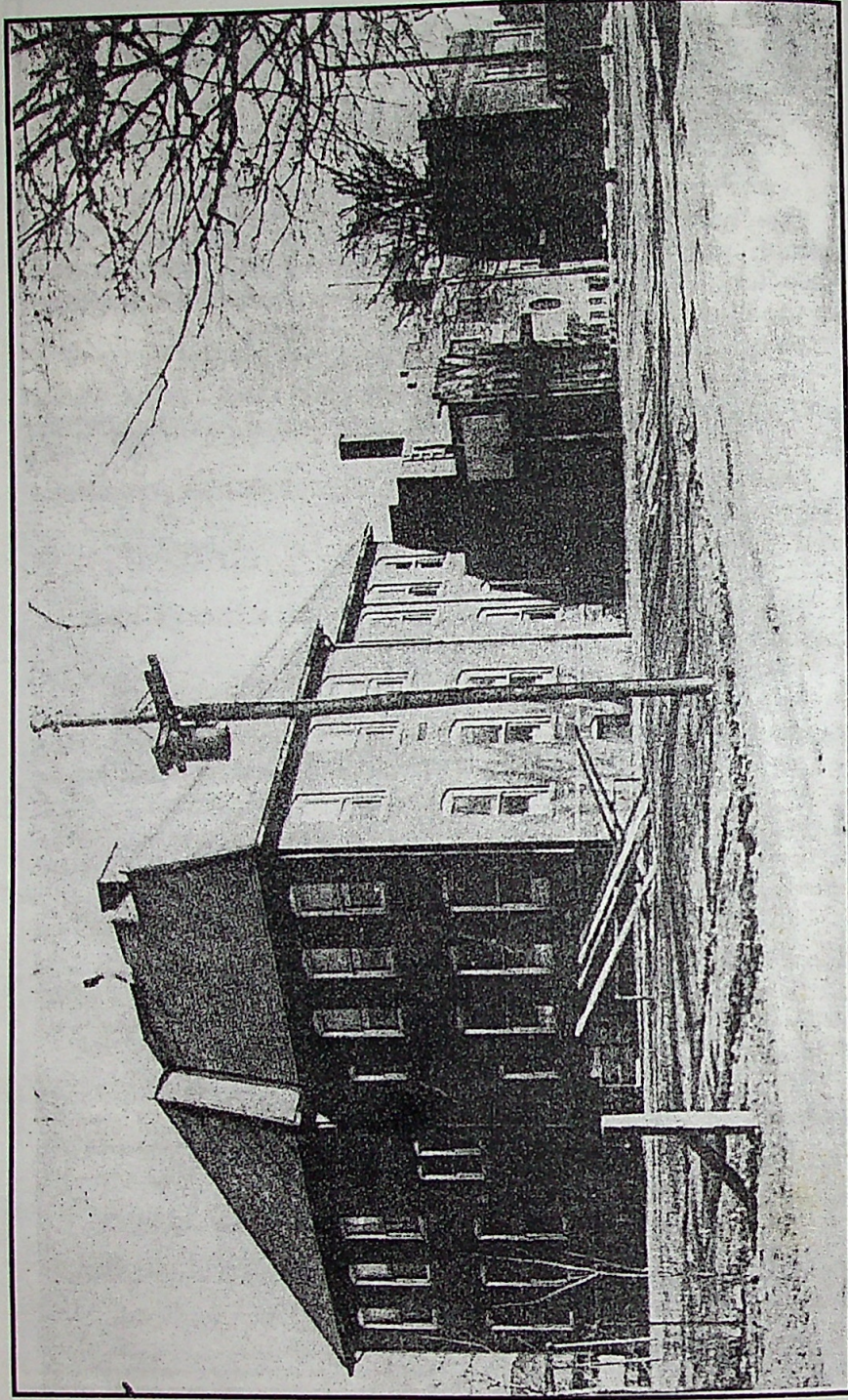
The alumni reunion is held the third Saturday of June, so the 2004 gathering will be June 19.

## National Do Not Call Registry

The National Do Not Call Registry, which is managed by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), gives you an opportunity to limit the telemarketing calls you receive. On October 1, 2003, when the National Do Not Call Registry will be enforced, most telemarketers will be required to remove the numbers on the Registry from their call lists.

Placing your number on the National Do Not Call Registry will stop about 80% of the telemarketing calls. You may still receive calls from political organizations, charities, telephone surveyors, or companies with which you have an existing business relationship.

If you register your phone number between June 27 and August 31, 2003, then you can file a complaint if a telemarketer calls you starting October 1, 2003. Solicitors who call homes on the National Registry after October 1 face fines of up to \$11,000 per call. The law will be enforced by the FTC, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), and some state law enforcement agencies.

Indiana will not be sharing the numbers on its existing State Do Not Call List with the National Do Not Call Registry. As a result, Indiana consumers who want their number on the National Registry must register separately.

Consumers who want to place their home or mobile phone numbers on the National Registry can do so online or by phone. Registration is free. Your phone number will remain on the Registry for five years from the date you register.

Note that consumers calling the toll-free number must call from the telephone they want registered.

Companies that are major users of telemarketing calls are preparing to shift efforts to e-mail and direct mail once the National Do Not Call Registry takes effect in October. According to the *Wall Street Journal*, many companies believe that those who do not sign up for the Do Not Call Registry will be more receptive to telephone pitches. "We'll be giving the dog what the dog wants to eat," said James F. Lyons, president of direct-marketer Optima Direct. The *Wall Street Journal* said that in addition to seeing more e-mail or junk mail, consumers who call companies on other business may now have to listen to sales pitches while negotiating voice mail messages.



## Telephone Privacy List

**Q:** What happens to my phone number that is already registered on Indiana's Telephone Privacy List?

**A:** Due to the Attorney General's Office involvement in discussions with the FTC, they will not preempt Indiana's law and telemarketers will still have to abide by Indiana's regulations that are much stricter than the National list. Most of the 27 states that have a telephone privacy program will be transferring their registered phone numbers to the FTC national list. Indiana WILL NOT be transferring Hoosiers' registered phone numbers to the FTC list. We are committed to continue providing Indiana residents who have registered their home phone number on the Telephone Privacy List with the greatest amount of protection possible from unwanted telemarketing calls.

**Q:** How do I register for Indiana's list?

**A:** You may register online 24 hours a day, seven days a week ([www.in.gov/attorneygeneral](http://www.in.gov/attorneygeneral)) or register by phone by calling toll-free: 1-888-834-9969. You will be asked to give some basic information regarding your home phone number, name, address etc. Register now to be on Indiana's Telephone Privacy list that will become effective October 1, 2003.

## Just Say No!

The Federal Trade Commission has compiled the following list of things you can do to "just say no."

- **Credit Bureaus:** Call 1-888-5-OPTOUT (567-8688) to opt out of having pre-approved credit offers sent to you for two years.
- **Direct Marketing:** The Direct Marketing Association offers the Mail and Telephone Preference Services, which allow you to reduce the amount of direct mail marketing and telemarketing you receive from many national companies for five years. You'll need to send a letter to:
  - **Direct mail:** Direct Marketing Association, Mail Preference Service, P.O. Box 643, Carmel, NY 10512.
  - **Telemarketing:** Direct Marketing Association, Telephone Preference Service, P.O. Box 1559, Carmel, NY 10512.
- **e-mail:** To opt out of receiving unsolicited commercial e-mail (good for one year), use the Direct Marketing Association's online form at [e-mps.org](http://e-mps.org).

- Latex paint (latex paint is nontoxic and should be allowed to dry out (cat litter in the paint will help) until it is non-liquid, then placed in the trash)

### Directions to Lebanon Street Department

Take I-65 to the SR 39 exit; go north on SR 39 to Main St. (stoplight on town square). Turn left (west) onto Main St. and proceed approx. 4-5 blocks. When you come to a "Y", turn right onto Lafayette Ave. The Lebanon Street Department is located at 1301 Lafayette Avenue (on the right/east side of the street just past Camp St.).

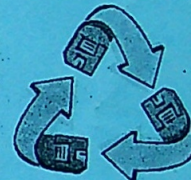
