## Pioneer Days Festival



The annual Whitestown Pioneer Days festival will kick off with a kids' pageant on Friday, September 12, at 6:00 p.m. Other events Friday evening include limbo and hoola hoop contests and a street dance until 11:00 p.m.

Saturday's agenda is jam-packed, beginning with the parade at 11:00 a.m. and concluding with live music until midnight. Other activities on Saturday include a karaoke

contest (all ages), a horseshoe tournament, BINGO, a haystack hunt, bucket brigade (get your team ready), tug-of-war (1200 pounds per team, \$15 entry fee), the Girl Scout cake walk, and the "How well do you know your spouse?" contest.

Sunday's schedule includes church services, live Christian music, an egg toss, chicken scratch, and water ball. The weekend's activities will conclude with the American Legion Auxiliary Surprise Auction at 4:00 and a raffle at 4:30 for the military flags used in the Pioneer Days float.

In addition to organized activities, there will be food galore! The Masonic Pancake Breakfast begins at 6:00 on Saturday morning. The American Legion will be serving breakfast at 7:00 a.m. on both Saturday and Sunday. Lunch/dinner choices include Methodist Church chicken & noodles, St. Mark's ham & beans, ABATE pork chops, a full menu at Ralph's Sports Pub and LA Café, and various food vendors along Main Street.

The weekend will also be filled with games, music, dancing, and vendor booths. Back by popular demand, Jump's Crossing will be taking old time photos again this year on all three days.

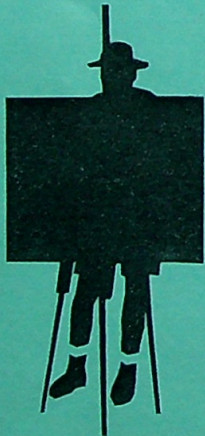

The request is for a change to UB (Urban Business) to allow for a small car sales lot.

# WHITESTOWN TOWN COUNCIL



Meeting Minutes  
August 11, 2003

At 7:30 p.m., Scott called the meeting to order. Kathy said roll call. Scott Abbott, Carla Jackson, and Mike McQueen were all present. Scott made the motion to approve last month's meeting minutes. Carla seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued.

## NEW BUSINESS

Marta spoke about a Town comprehensive plan. She has spoken to Mike and Carla about getting a grant. We need to submit a letter of intent to the Chamber of Commerce. She figures this could be a 10 percent input on the Town's part. She would like this to start moving forward. September would be the site meeting. She would like to have this agreement signed tonight. She said the Board needs to designate an administrator. Carla suggested she contact Erin Culp. Marta has talked with Dan Lake. Kathy suggested Amy Miller if Marta needs any assistance. Mike made a motion for Scott to sign a letter of intent. Carla seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued. Marta stated the Board needs to appoint a person on the Board to head this up. Mike said he would help.

Scott spoke about hiring a part-time officer; he explained how the interview process will proceed.

## OLD BUSINESS

Carla said due to the stacks of paperwork about purchasing Boone County Utilities, we are withdrawing from this list. Carla made the motion we withdraw the offer to purchase Boone Utilities. Mike seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued.

Scott made a motion all of the following ordinances be held until next month to wait for changes from Boone County. Carla seconded the motion; unanimous vote followed.

- Ordinance 2003-08, An Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance of Whitestown Concerning Development Plan Regulations (second reading)

- Ordinance 2003-09, An Amendment to the Subdivision Control Ordinance of Whitestown Concerning Minor Plat Exemptions (second reading)
- Ordinance 2003-10, An Amendment to the Subdivision Control Ordinance of Whitestown Concerning Emergency Warning Sirens (second reading)
- Ordinance 2003-11, An Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Whitestown Concerning Table 2 -Authorized Uses (second reading)

## MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Carla spoke about the accepted water easement; Mike Andreoli is here on behalf of Beazer. Carla has been working with Jim, Michael and the Bannisters. They have made an agreement (Carla read the agreement). Beazer will pay the Bannisters \$4000 for the easement. Carla stated this is a final resolution on the easement. Culey will fix the fence and yard. Beazer will fix the south side; Culey will fix the east side. Greg and Sally Bannister both agreed. Sally, Greg, Scott, Carla and Mike M. initialized the agreement. Kathy notarized the agreement after it was signed. Carla made a motion we accept the agreement with items one through five. Mike seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued. Mike Andreoli will call Carla about the wording in the contract.

Carla announced Beazer will pay up to \$17,820 to go toward the walking trail project.

Marta asked about all utilities on 400 S and 65 E. Carla said we have no control over this. Mike McQueen said they will put them wherever is cost effective.

The Town assisting Pioneer Days with a donation was discussed.

Ed Krouse asked about police coverage while Ralph is out on sick leave. Scott stated Ralph's attorney said he should be better in a couple of days.

Carla asked about the status of the building and moving. Kathy said we are waiting to hear back from the old school. Carla said we need to come up with a worst-case scenario.

Mike Adukes asked who the Board works for. Scott said the people. Mike Adukes said Mike McQueen lied to him. Mike McQueen stated he is elected to serve the Town.

Carla spoke about the responsibility of investigating accusations. She stated it is the Town Board's responsibility to follow up on accusations, review, and investigate.

#### Street Department: John Allen

John Allen gave a Beazer update. The APC has approved sections two and three. It was in the paper today. Twenty-eight houses are being lived in, four still to move in, and John estimates fifteen more next month.

Carla added the homes out there now are in the \$160,000 to \$170,000 range. The newer model next month will be in the \$220,000 range.

Ed Krouse asked about the newspaper ad today. The address was wrong. They need to change the address.

Debra Zachelmeyer asked about the water account status of the three people turned off this month. Kathy said one is locked off and must pay in full. We are putting a lien against this property. Debra Zachelmeyer asked about kids being in this house without water. Kathy said we have to inform the Board of Health.

#### Wastewater Plant Status

Darin stated they completed the drain at Walnut and Uitts. Carla asked about the drain at Smith and Main. Darin said he needs to get with Carla in the morning to show him where this drain is located. Darin asked about a raise due to him passing the test. Mike made a motion to give Darin a 50-cents-per-hour raise. This is retroactive from when he took his test.

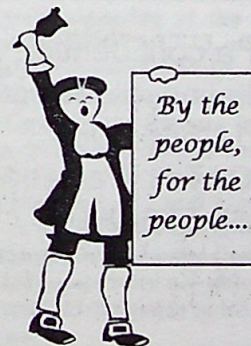
#### Park Update: Marta Haza

Marta Haza has spoken with Lance Brock. The Parks Board has two options for the trail. The Parks Board met and agreed. They would like a trail around the park. Marta asked if Beazer is doing the trail at a better cost than if the Town has to hire the contractors and get bids. Carla said she feels if we want them to do this, she feels they will do this. Marta spoke about filling the holes with dirt to level out the ground. Dan Kragenbrink has fixed some of the holes. Marta said she has been working with Chris Herrick about the well in the park. Marta stated the toddler area will be ready by Pioneer Days.

#### Whitestown Board of Zoning Update

Estelle Albright is not here this month; Jerre Albright stated there has been no letter from the APC about the Walker Farms yard barns. Jerre also asked about the shrubs around the TDS building. He stated they have not been completed yet. Dave Hackett said he would check into the status of this.

Carla made the motion that the August 11, 2003, Whitestown Town Council meeting be adjourned. Mike seconded the motion; unanimous vote ensued.

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## Town of Whitestown 2004 Proposed Budget

### Notice to Taxpayers of Budget Estimates and Tax Levies

Notice is hereby given the taxpayers of Town of Whitestown, Boone County, Whitestown, Indiana, that the Town Board of Whitestown at Town Hall on September 2, 2003, at 6:30 p.m. will conduct a public hearing on the budget. Following this meeting, any ten or more taxpayers may object to a budget, tax rate, or tax levy by filing an objecting petition with the proper officers of the political subdivision within seven days after the hearing. The objecting petition must identify the provisions of the budget, tax rate, or tax levy that taxpayers object to. If a petition is filed, the political subdivision shall adopt with its budget a finding concerning the objections filed and testimony presented. Following the aforementioned meeting, the fiscal body will meet at Town Hall on September 15, 2003, at 6:00 p.m. to adopt the following budget:

The 2004 estimated maximum levy limitation for this unit is 75.241.

The Property Tax Replacement Credit used to reduce the rate for this unit is 0.

Taxpayers appearing at the hearing shall have an opportunity to be heard. Pursuant to IC-6-1.1-17-13, after the tax levies have been determined, fixed by the appropriate governing body, and the tax rates published by the County Auditor, ten or more taxpayers objecting to the levies may appeal to the Department of Local Government Finance by filing a petition with the County Auditor. The petition must be filed on or before the tenth day after publication of the proposed rates charged. The County Auditor will then forward the objection petition to the Department of Local Government Finance for consideration. However, a group of ten or more taxpayers may not initiate an appeal against the notice of tax rates published by the County Auditor if less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the taxpayers were not objecting taxpayers on the objection petition filed upon publication of the notice to taxpayers of budget estimates and tax levies published by the unit.

### Worth Township and Union Township Propose Increasing Fire Budgets and Adding Paid Standbys

At a joint meeting between Worth and Union townships on August 25, a proposal was made to increase the budgets of both fire departments and to add paid standbys.

The Worth Township Fire Department serves all of Worth Township, as well as the western half of Union Township (CR 975 East is the boundary). Union Township currently contributes \$23,000 to the WTFD for providing this service. Under the proposed budget, Union Township's fire budget would increase from \$60,000 to \$195,000, with \$123,500 going to the WTFD. Worth Township's fire budget for 2004 would increase from \$123,000 to \$345,000. According to Rob Guest, a budget increase is necessary due to forecasted growth in the area (e.g., the Walker Farms subdivision of 1000+ homes).

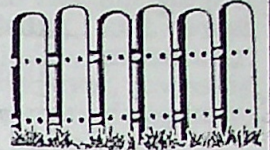
The fact that the majority of the WTFD's runs are medically related is one of the main reasons for adding paid standbys. Under the proposal, three paid standbys (one paramedic firefighter and two FMT firefighters) would be on duty from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

A second budget hearing is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on Monday, September 8, at the Worth Township Fire Station.

### WALKER FARMS SECTIONS 2 & 3 RECEIVE FAVORABLE APC RECOMMENDATION

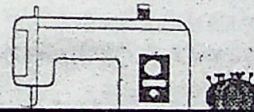
At the Boone County APC (Area Plan Commission) meeting last month, Crossmann Walker Farms received favorable recommendations for sections two and three. Two Whitestown residents, Estelle Albright and Marta Haza, presented arguments.

Estelle Albright informed the APC of problems with the "buffer yard" between the subdivision and the Albright property, which is zoned for agricultural use and borders about 20 homes in the first section of the development. She suggested that the definition of "buffer yard" be provided in the paperwork a new homeowner receives. Michael Andreoli, attorney for Crossmann, agreed to include the information in the covenants for the homeowners. APC Chairman Ken Hedge advised that the APC will follow up with homeowners who violate the regulations.



APC Board member Marta Haza brought up the issue of whether Whitestown/Worth Township will be able to provide police and fire services to this many homes, noting that property tax revenue from these homes will not be received until at least the spring of 2005.

The Board voted 4-1 for a favorable recommendation, with Marta Haza casting the dissenting vote.

## Important Election Information

The election cycle runs in terms of 4 years. This year is only for cities and towns (only the voters inside the town limits are eligible to vote). In 2004 will be presidential, governor, some U.S. senators & representatives, auditor, treasurer, recorder, county council at-large (3 seats), 2 county commissioner seats, school board and a couple of others. In 2005, it is an "off" election year; we hold no election, we just work on re-precincting and re-districting and voter registration. In 2006, clerk, assessor, judge, prosecutor, county council (4 district seats), sheriff, surveyor, township assessors and trustees, precinct committeemen, delegate to the state convention and school board will be up.

## IMPORTANT DATES FOR 2003 ELECTION

**Sept. 15:** Noon deadline to file as a "write-in" candidate.

**Sept. 25:** Deadline for the Clerk's Office to send out an absentee ballot to voters who have already filed an application with the office. The applications received after this date will have ballots sent ASAP.

**Oct. 6:** The last day for voter registration to be eligible to vote in this election. This is also the first day of absentee voting in the Election Office in the Courthouse.

**Oct. 23:** The first day the "traveling board" may vote a confined person at a private residence or nursing home or a voter with disabilities that cannot get to the polls to vote.

**Oct. 25:** Election Office in the Courthouse will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to accommodate absentee voting.

**Oct. 27:** Midnight deadline for the Clerk's Office to receive absentee applications for voting by mail.

**Nov. 1:** Election Office in the Courthouse will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to accommodate absentee voting.

**Nov. 3:** Absentee voting in the Election Office and by "traveling board" until noon.

**Nov. 4:** ELECTION DAY! Polls are open from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Citizens can monitor the progress of the election on their computer after 6:00 p.m. on Election Day. The website is [www.bccn.boone.in.us](http://www.bccn.boone.in.us). The results are only a few seconds to a couple of minutes behind reading them in the Clerk's Office. The site can be accessed currently to learn who the candidates are for the municipal election.

But more than the flag is passing by.

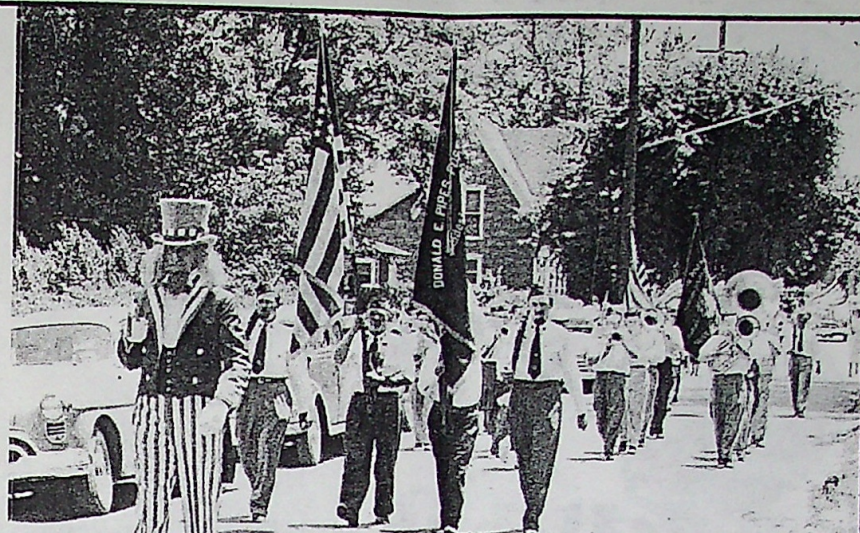
Sea-fights and land-fights, grim and great,

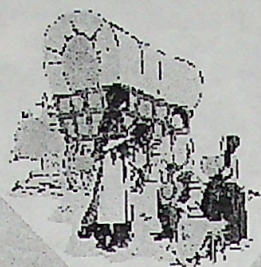

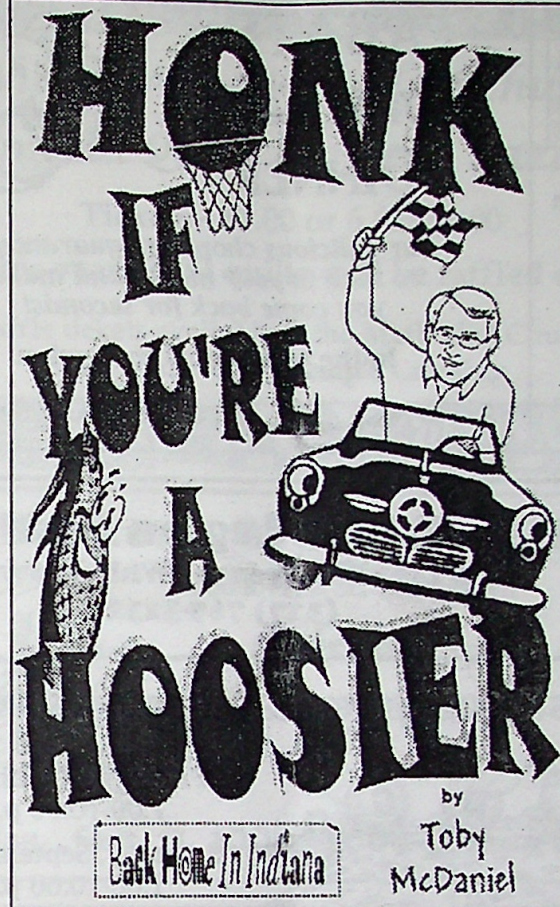

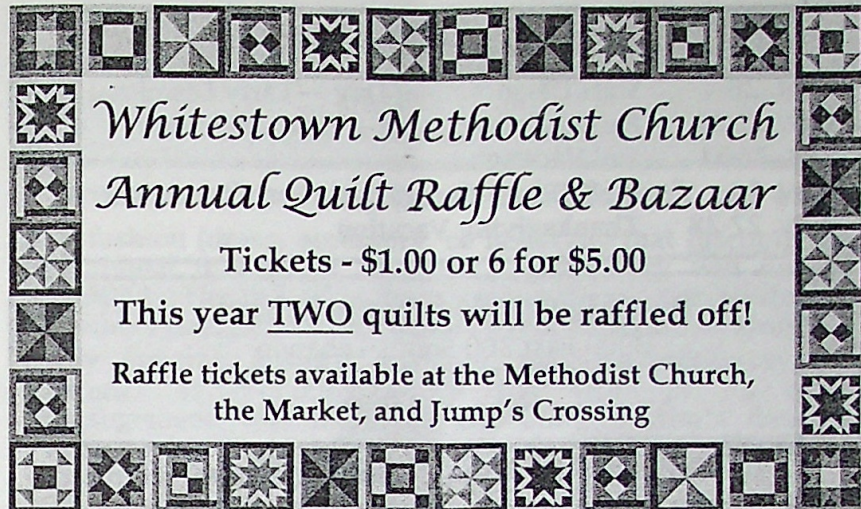

### Dress and Grooming (Student Handbook, pg. 19)

Any fashion (dress, accessory, or hairstyle) that disrupts the educational process or presents a safety risk will not be permitted. The following dress code will be enforced during the school day, and at after school events (home and away):

- Any apparel, jewelry, cosmetic make-up, accessory, or manner of grooming which by virtue of its color arrangement, trademark, or any other attribute denotes membership in a gang or advocates drug use, violence, or disruptive behavior is prohibited.
- All tops must have sleeves, cover the top of the shoulder, shall extend down the arm a minimum of 3 inches, and shall not reveal the chest or underarm or expose undergarments. All tops, shirts, blouses, etc., must extend no less than 3 inches past the top of the student's pants, slacks, shorts, skirts, etc. It is not acceptable for the top to only reach the pant line when in a relaxed position.
- Spray-painted or other drastic hair coloring or style is prohibited.
- Attire that may damage school property or cause injury to others (wallets with chains, etc.) is not to be worn.
- Coats, hats, shorts (out-of-season and shorter than *knee* length), pajamas or sleepwear, bicycle pants, tank tops, halters, beach wear, mini-skirts, sagging pants, clothing with large holes or tears, items which promote drugs, alcohol, tobacco, anti-social behaviors, or items otherwise deemed unacceptable by the principal are prohibited. Underwear is not to be exposed.
- Short pants, skorts, and capri pants may be worn during the first and last grading periods of the school year. Shorts must be *knee* length or longer.
- Body piercings present a safety concern and therefore are not permitted. Ear piercings are permitted if they are not excessive or a safety issue. Physical education teachers or coaches may request the piercing be removed or taped during the activity.
- Theme/spirit dress up days must first be approved by the administrators.

If there is a question as to whether or not a student's appearance is appropriate for school, school officials will make that determination.

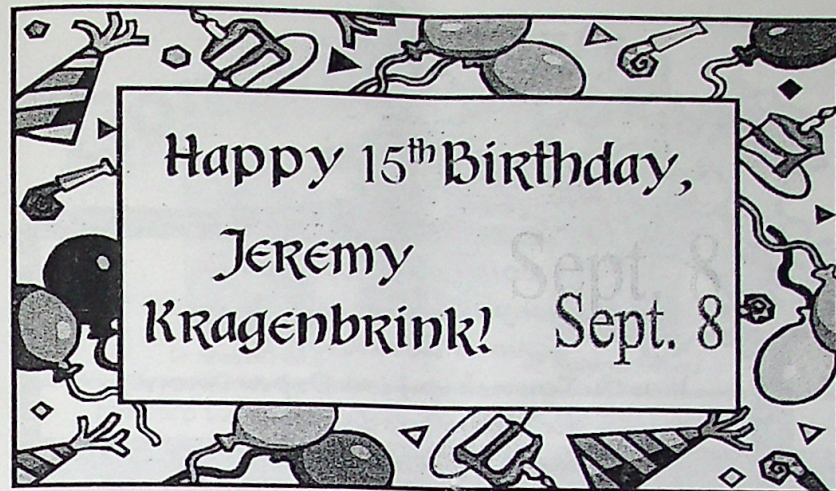

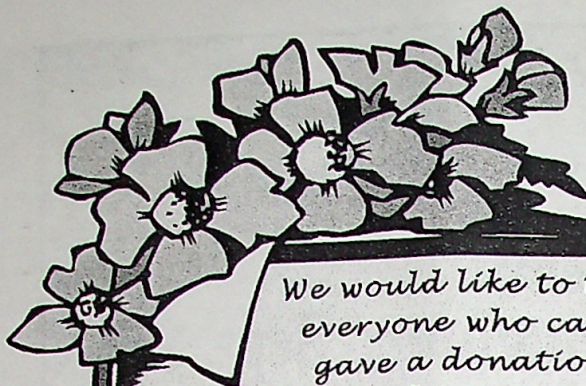

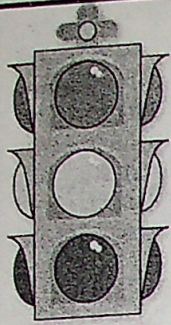
