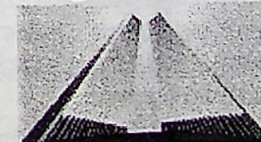
SEPTEMBER 11, 2001

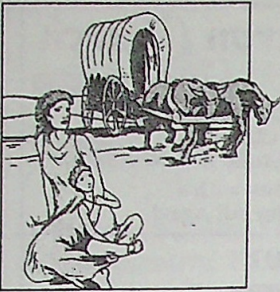

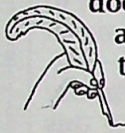

THE PIONEERS ARE COMING!
THE PIONEERS ARE COMING!
(PIONEER DAYS, THAT IS)

Once again, it's just about time for Whitestown's annual "Pioneer Days" observance — or, as many consider it, homecoming. This big weekend community celebration hasn't always been called Pioneer Days but — by whatever label, the event itself in varying forms goes way back; w-a-a-a-a-a-y back! Probably back to Whitestown's founding in 1851; as early as the little prairie town had enough souls to form a crowd on Main Street. And, no doubt, that first big blowout was dubbed "Settler Days." But we can only assume. Unfortunately, not much was documented back then. But, hey, it wasn't easy to



document stuff in those days. Think about it; pencils and notebooks had to be in short supply, and typewriters — electric typewriters particularly — were really scarce, and nobody in town had a computer. (Lucky them!) One fairly contemporary scholar, in pondering pioneer life in Whitestown, came up with this two-pronged theory: One, that the settlers were too dad-blame busy getting settled to even think about recording what was destined to be history. First and foremost, they had to clear the land and build cheap log houses so they wouldn't have to live forever in their RVs. They had to tend their crops, and fend off unfriendly Indians, door-to-door encyclopedia salesmen and animal rights activists.

On top of all that, they closely guarded their livestock, fearing that cutthroat rustlers from Zionsville would steal their chickens, goats, cows and mules. Legend has it that one feller, who was eventually elected the town's first mayor, feared rustlers so much that he always slept in the barn with his prize hog "Beethoven" which was the Indiana State Fair's grand champion boar three years in a row.



Other things took gobs more of the hard-working settlers' time: twice-a-week municipal band practice, taking the kids to soccer every other night, rotating the wheels and changing axle grease on the covered wagon, baths for the kids every Saturday night, filling the swimming pool/draining the swimming pool, putting up outdoor Christmas lights/taking down outdoor Christmas lights, etc.



And family recreation was an important part of a settler's lifestyle; that included trips to the drive-in theater and outlet mall. No wonder they didn't have time to record history. So, we'll go with what we know.



Whitestown's annual fling in the early 1900s was known as the "Redman's Picnic" and, according to storytelling by some of those who were there, the picnic site and present-day Lions Club Park are one and the same. Whether or not it was official, as a kid in Whitestown in the '40s and '50s, I heard many references to "Redman's Park" but by that time, the event was known as the "Whitestown Picnic." Basically, that event featured a small carnival and several food tents. Drago Amusements brought in the basic carnival games, a ferris wheel, merry-go-round and a couple of kiddy rides. Church groups operated large food tents featuring home cooking, a full menu, from sandwiches to plate lunches and complete dinners to hot-out-of-the-oven fruit pies and hand-dipped ice cream. (I'll never forget the hand-dipped ice cream. That was my job in the Methodist Church tent; I dipped ice cream all day long and late into the night. My arm was lame for a week.) Everybody in town and throughout the countryside always went to the picnic — so did anyone who had moved away. Without a doubt, the food and camaraderie were the big attractions then and probably

Excerpts from Sesquicentennial Celebration
by *Lois Lindley*

Elma Wilson Sortor: My first remembrance of Whitestown was when I was a small girl my family would pack a fried chicken dinner and come to the Red Man's Picnic on Saturday. We would stay until the balloon went up.

John D. Isenhour: I recall attending the Red Man's Picnic each year that was held where the Lion's Club Park is now located.

Paul Groover: The Redman's Picnic was a big event. Will Witt always painted his face and dressed up like an Indian. He was a good-sized man and he scared us kids to death.

Kenny Allen: The annual Red Man's Picnic was held in the Lion's Club Park before houses were built on the front of this area. Local children would be there when the "carnies" came to town to fetch water, set up tents and earn money so we could give it all back when they opened. On one Saturday night when the carnival ride area was crowded with people, I got the bright idea to set off three fireworks rockets in the air. The only problem was when I lit the fuse, I accidentally knocked the rockets over and they went off on the ground in the crowd. I did not show my face around there for a few days. One other time I "loaned" Dad's sledgehammer to a carnie to pound tent stakes and when they left town, the sledgehammer left with them. I learned a lesson that day. After the carnival closed on Saturday night, a few of us would get up bright and early Sunday morning to walk and search the carnival grounds to look for coins that people had dropped. Ernest "Snooks" Wilson lived across the street from us and we would see who could get there first and find the most coins. Snooks would usually arrive before I did and would tell me a long-winded tale of just finding a twenty-dollar bill. I would usually make a beeline for the place where the penny arcade tent stood and look for money. More often than not, I would go home empty-handed.

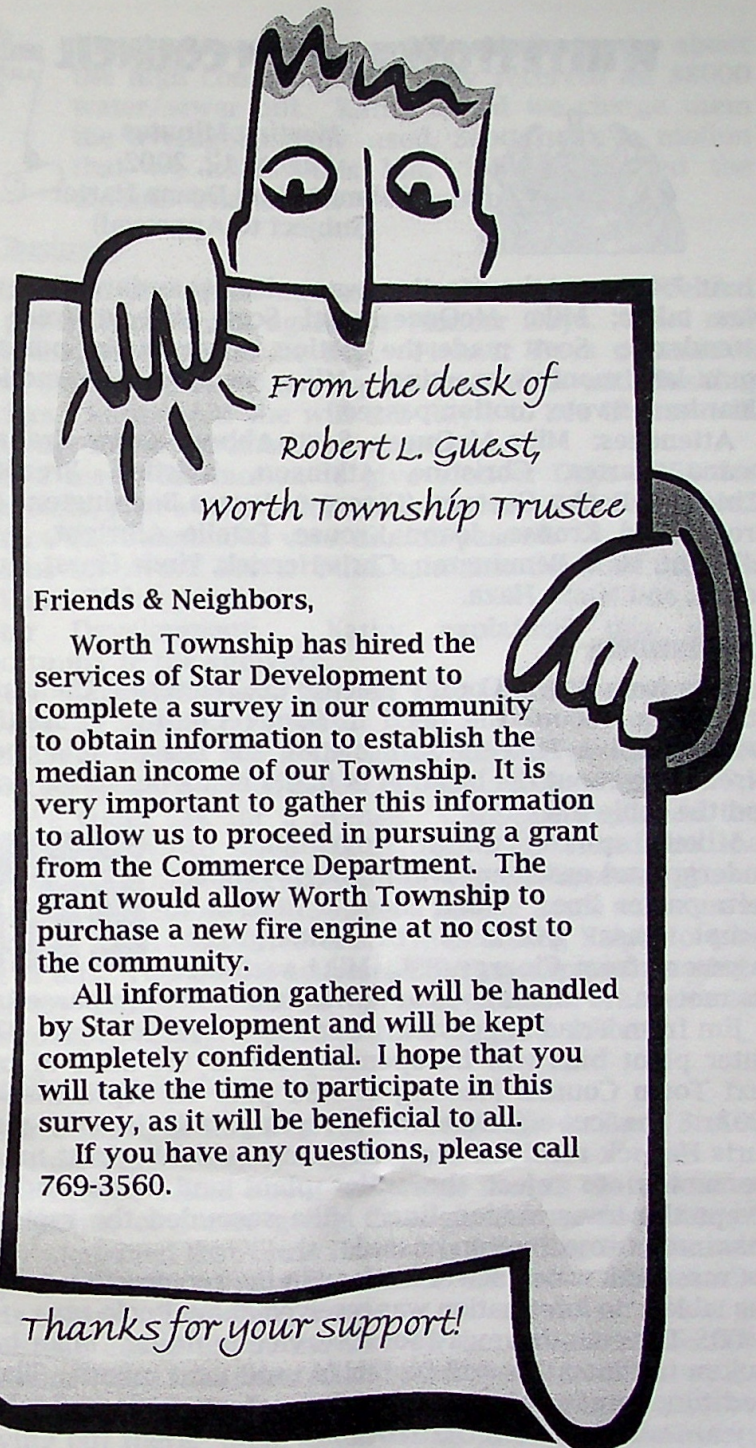
Anna Crane: The Redman's Picnic was a great attraction. As a girl, we came often. Everyone organized their dinner and came. The Merry-Go-Round was quite an attraction for small boys and girls then. The teen-agers liked to ride it too. Then later we had a Senior Citizen's meeting place in the Fire Station and Township building. We made things to sell. Handmade articles, cakes, pies, jelly, pickles, fancy aprons, tea towels, doilies, pillowslips, whatever. After we were married, we went quite a lot too. You could see old friends and make new ones.

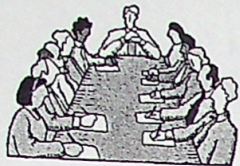

Meeting Minutes
August 12, 2002

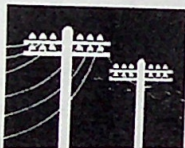
At 7:40 p.m., the meeting was called to order. Roll call was taken; Mike McQueen and Scott Abbott were in attendance. Scott made the motion to accept the minutes from last month's meeting. Mike seconded the motion. Unanimous vote; motion passed.

Attendees: Mike McQueen, Scott Abbott, Kathy Graham, Deana Harter, Christine Atkinson, Kristina Breeding (Cinergy), Becky Coatney (Cinergy), JoAnn Bennington, Jay Broglin, Ed Krouse, Joann Krouse, Estelle Albright, Jerre Albright, Mark Bennington, Chris Herrick, Linda Hurst, Ruth Edens, and Marta Haza.

New Business

Tina from Boone County Electric Co. requested the cause number to record the deed in Boone County. Christine Atkinson gave Tina the information she has on this deed. Discussion about the location of lights being put in the park and the cable lines.

Mike spoke about overhead or underground easement from Cinergy/PSI for their power lines. Scott made a motion to accept pass overhead or underground easement from Cinergy/PSI. Mike seconded the motion. A unanimous vote was taken; motion passed.



Jim from Triad suggested we set up a date for bids. The water plant bids will be opened prior to the start of our next Town Council Meeting at 7:30 p.m. on September 9, 2002. The cut-off time for accepting bids is 1:00 p.m. Chris Herrick received the plant plans tonight. Scott made the motion to reject the water plant and wells and to accept the transmission line. Mike seconded the motion. Unanimous vote; motion passed.

Crossmann water/sewer hook-up in the construction trailer was tabled; no information was received about hook-up.

TDS Telecom driveway for a service building: Mike has spoken to them; this will be tabled until next month. They need to submit a letter of what they intend to do and what they are wanting from the Town.



Jump's Crossing Water Bill: Kathy spoke about the high consumption. They received an \$8000 water/sewer bill. Kathy asked we charge them the average usually used. Scott made a motion that we adjust this bill. Mike seconded the motion. Unanimous vote; motion passed.

Old Business

Mike said the Legion wants to use the parking lot behind the police department again for Pioneer Days. Mike and Scott said this should be fine. Pioneer Days committee asked about the Town paying for port-a-lets and flashing barriers. Kathy said she will call Ray's to see if they will dump our dumpster after Pioneer Days.

Scott made the motion to give Pioneer Days \$350 for dumpsters, port-a-lets, and flashing barriers. Mike seconded the motion. Unanimous vote; motion passed.

Lions Club Park Drive: Mike said that the park drive is the Lions Club's property.

Star Development: Kathy explained this grant opportunity to the audience.

Cum Cap Fund: Marta said the 15th is our 30 days. Tom will call the auditor on Friday.

Christine spoke about the Carey property. He cannot lease this property to us; he already has a lease with the Co-op. We could ask for a license. Christine explained the options we have to solve this matter. Mark stated that the Co-op is still obstructing the right-of-way to the sewer plant.

Audience member spoke about a mobile home someone is living in. Scott addressed this. He is asking Ralph to take care of this. This can be addressed during a special meeting.

Every unit must be on its own meter. We have an apartment in town, we need to get a separate meter.

Miscellaneous Business

Jerre Albright asked about the stop sign on Buck Street. Scott said this is a Safety Board issue.

Ed Krouse asked about the water meters that measure the amount of water going through the outdoor faucet. Kathy explained that Chris Herrick is handling this, he said they should be ready by the end of the week. Mike asked Chris to hold off on this for now.

Estelle asked about the size of the streets in the new addition. Mike said John Allen is out there checking on the streets. She also spoke about 4-wheel drives and children playing out there. Mike asked Kathy to send Crossmann a

letter informing them of this situation. Scott asked her to certify this.

Scott spoke about the Safety Board. He will need one Board member and two individuals to make up the Safety Board. Next month we will talk more about this. If you see anything that needs to be addressed, let Kathy know.

Mark asked about a computer for the sewer plant. Scott made a motion to purchase a computer up to \$1000 for the sewer plant. Mike seconded the motion. Unanimous vote; motion passed.

Trash issue was tabled last month until January 2003; we will readdress this then.

Kathy asked about Deana and Kathy attending Conference September 15-19. Scott made a motion Kathy and Deana attend September Conference; Mike seconded the motion. Unanimous vote; motion passed.

TOWN OF WHITESTOWN TITLE 3: PUBLIC HEALTH & SAFETY ARTICLE 1: ANIMAL REGULATION CHAPTER 1: LICENSING OF DOGS



Section 1. City Limits: That all dogs kept, owned or harbored within the Town of Whitestown, Indiana, shall be licensed by the owner thereof.

Section 2. Charge: That the charge for said license shall be set by the Board of Trustees annually, the same to be paid by the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 3. Register: The Clerk-Treasurer shall keep a register of said license and issue tags to the owner which shall be attached to a collar worn by the dog.

Section 4. Running at Large: It shall be unlawful to permit any dog to run at large within the town limits of Whitestown, Indiana, and the permitting of the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

Section 5. Nuisance: It shall be unlawful to permit any dog within the town limits of Whitestown, Indiana, to disturb the peace and quiet of the immediate surrounding neighborhood by constant barking. The permitting of the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

Section 6. Violation of Section 4: Any dog found to be running at large in violation of Section 4 above shall be taken into custody by authority of the town and disposed of in accordance with rules established by the Board of Town Trustees.

Section 7. Public Streets: In the event any dog is on the streets of the Town of Whitestown, Indiana, it shall be on a leash and under control of its owner.

Section 8. Muzzled Dogs: In the event any owner has a licensed dog which has a practice of escaping from his custody or biting people, he shall keep a muzzle on said dog at all times. In the event any such muzzled and licensed dog is found running loose on the streets, such dog shall be taken into custody and the owner notified. If such dog is not claimed by the owner within three (3) hours after being notified, said dog shall be disposed of in accordance with the terms of Section 6 above.

Section 9. Custody of Animals: In the event there is a violation of Section 8, above set out, the same may be prosecuted on affidavit filed by the complaining party. Upon receiving such complaint, the Town Marshal is authorized to take such dog into custody. The Town Marshal shall keep such dog in his custody until the owner is notified and the actions thereunder are remedied by proper steps, including but not limited to, the muzzling of said dog.

Section 10. Fines: In the event any person violates any provision of this ordinance, he shall be fined not less than \$10, nor more than \$500.



ORDINANCE 2002-01:

WHEREAS, in the interest of judicial economy the Whitestown Town Council recognizes a need to establish an Ordinance Violations Bureau;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Council of Whitestown, Indiana, hereby amends Title 2, Section 5 of the Whitestown Code by the addition of the following provision and the creation of an Ordinance Violations Bureau pursuant to IC 33-6-3-1, et seq., as amended, for the Town.

G. ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS BUREAU

Section 1: Administration

The Clerk of the Court is hereby appointed and shall serve as the Violations Clerk who shall administer the Bureau.

Section 2: Procedure

The Violations Clerk, shall accept written appearances, waivers of trial, admissions of violations, and payment of civil penalties in the amount and for the violation as provided below, receipt for said payment, and account for all payments per the State Board of Accounts guidelines

Section 3: Penalty Schedule

The following schedule of ordinances and Whitestown Code provisions shall be subject to the jurisdictions of the Ordinances Violations Bureau. The first and second admission of the same violation within a calendar year of said ordinance and/or code provision shall be subject to the civil penalty set forth herein:

The second admission of violation of the same ordinance or code provision scheduled above within a calendar year shall be subject to the penalty set forth. Any third allegation of violation of the same ordinance or code provision scheduled above within a calendar year shall be referred to the Town Court. In no event shall any civil penalty collected for a single ordinance violation by the ordinance violations bureau exceed the fifty dollar (\$50.00) maximum permitted by statute.

Section 4: Right To Trial

In the event a person charged with a violation pursuant to this ordinance elects to exercise the right to trial, the person shall appear before the violations clerk and deny the violation or enter a written denial with the clerk and the clerk shall schedule said defendant for trial in the normal course.

Section 5: Failure to Satisfy Penalty

All persons denying a violation covered under this provision; failing to satisfy a penalty assessed by the clerk after admitting said violation; or failing to deny or admit said violation, shall be processed through the court.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication.

Passed by the Town Council this 18th day of March, 2002.

Meet the Town Council: Mike McQueen

Mike McQueen is a no-nonsense man of action. His usual mode of operation involves cutting to the chase and grabbing the bull by the horns. He stays on task, maintains a brisk pace, and follows a three-step, bottom-line approach to most issues:

What's the problem?
What's the solution?
Summarize it!

During our interview, we discussed the recent theft of my son's bicycle. True to form, Mike picked up the phone, called Scott Abbott, and requested that a bicycle identification program be put on the agenda of the next Safety Board meeting.

A member of the Whitestown Town Council since November 1998, Mike believes that he can offer solutions to many of Whitestown's problems. When asked what factors led to his decision to serve on the Board, Mike replied, "I felt there were opportunities that fit my general idea of what this town could be."



Until recently, Mike was in charge of zoning, parks, and police. Thanks to newly created specialty boards, he is now able to devote his attention to the area of development. The liaisons for the specialty areas are:

Safety—Scott Abbott
Parks—Marta Haza
Zoning—Estelle Albright
Streets—John Allen
Utilities—Chris Herrick
Sewer—Mark Bennington

In response to questions about the progress of the Crossmann development, Mike advised that 3-5 model homes could be open by the end of October. Floor plans for the one- and two-story homes are currently available for review at Town Hall.

According to Mike, Crossmann is in the process of deciding whether to heat the homes with electricity or natural gas. Early indications are that the cost of installing natural gas pipelines would be prohibitive (i.e., "astronomical"). Mike was quick to point out that even if Crossmann were to decide on natural gas, it would NOT mean that natural gas would be available in Town.

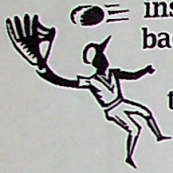
LION PRIDE, COMMUNITY WIDE.

Flu Shots

On October 2, Boone County Health Department personnel will administer flu shots to homebound Whitestown residents, including elderly, sick and those who find it difficult to leave their residences. If you or someone you know is in need of this service, please call (765) 482-3942 to schedule an appointment.

On October 4, flu shots will be administered at the Boone County Health Department for persons 60 years of age and older, or those with a chronic illness. The cost of the flu shot is \$10; pneumonia shots are also available for \$15. Medicare will be billed; all others must pay cash. The Boone County Health Department is located in the basement of the Boone County Office Annex, 116 W. Washington St., Lebanon.

The Visiting Nurse Service will be offering flu shot clinics in October and November. The cost of the flue shot is \$18; pneumonia shots are available for \$25. Medicare Part-B recipients may receive one or both shots at no charge. The VNS clinic schedule is as follows:

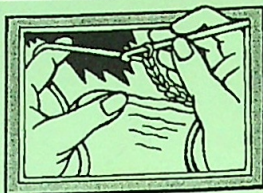
