Whitestown Readies For Third Celebration

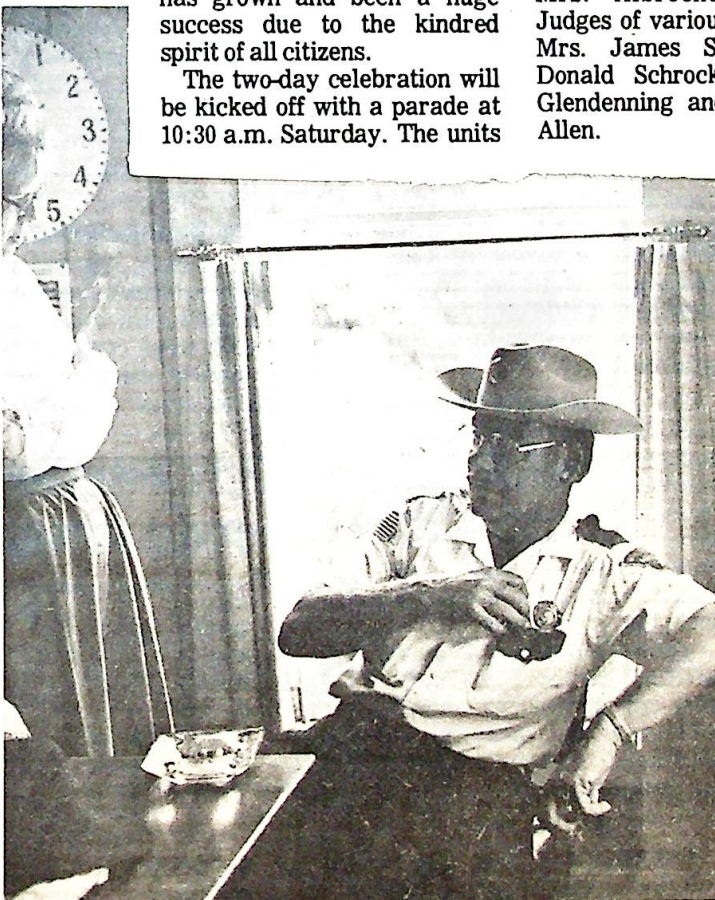
Now in its third year Whitestown Pioneer Days is typical of the great spirit of small communities—people working together for others ... families uniting in work, play and fellowship... businesses, small industries, clubs, organizations and churches doing their share as vital and integral in a primarily rural urban town that is changing and growing. This is American spirit—reminiscent of forefathers and this is just what the Whitestownites are doing—rekindling that old pioneer "bondness" and history.

Pioneer Days was the brainchild of three women—Ginger Clark, Janice West and Lois Lindley, all of whom were interested in building a Community Center in Whitestown. The celebration has grown and been a huge success due to the kindred spirit of all citizens.

The two-day celebration will be kicked off with a parade at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. The units

will assemble and leave the Lions Club Community Park at the designated time and will proceed up Barnes or Main Street, south to Laughner Street, then west to Bowers and to the Old Ball Park.

Serving as head of advertising is Mrs. James Smithes; the Parade Committee consists of Mrs. Donald Sortor, Sr. and Rev. Dale Beutler and serving on the Lassie Committee is Mrs. Albrecht, chairman. Judges of various contests are Mrs. James Smithes, Mrs. Donald Schrock, Mrs. Kent Glendenning and Mrs. Karla Allen.

Congressman John T. Myers will serve as Parade Marshal Saturday in the first event of the two-day Whitestown Pioneer celebration and also will be on hand to present a flag to the community. Some 65 units are to be in the parade including many antique vehicles or replicas, floats, horse units along with bands from Lebanon, Zionsville and Cardinal Ritter.

Reigning over the festivities as "Pioneer Lassie" will be Debbie Knaflich. In her court are Geraldine Dreiling, Penny Brower and Leisa Willis. Debbie was chosen Lassie last night in the final meeting of the Pioneer Days Committee by penny vote.

This year's Lassie is the 17-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Knaflich of Whitestown. She is a senior at Lebanon High School where she is a member of the French Club and Cheerblock. The five-foot four-inch brunette has lived in Whitestown for two years. She is a member of Whitestown United Methodist Church and its choir and serves as secretary of the church M.Y.F. group. She also is a member of the Whitestown Community Center and has been working on Pioneer Days this summer. In fact, the float she will be on in the parade is for the most part constructed from her ideas and design. This summer Debbie worked fulltime, and will continue part-time now that school has started at Zionsville Hoosier Village.

"Exprit de corps" could well describe Whitestown for it and her people have a singleness of heart and adherence to duty, a bond, a group feeling, an allegiance which is unsurpassed — making Pioneer Days so successful.

Whitestown, originally called "Germantown" is the capital of little Worth, the baby township of the county and is situated near the middle of the township making it the center of trade of one of the best agricultural districts in the county.

Whitestown was laid out in 1851 at the time the railroad was built, on the land of Abram Neese. Harrison Spencer is said to be the first man to sell goods in the town. He was soon followed by Henry Lucas and William Laughner. Isaac Dye and Alfred Osborn were the first to venture to build a grist mill to manufacture bread-stuffs for the people. The milling privileges at Whitestown were poor — folks had to travel to Zionsville, Mechanicsburg or Thorntown

to have grain made into flour or meal. There was no water power in Worth Township so the early citizens had to depend upon steam, creating fire hazards. The first mill burned in a few years and Henry Lucas rebuilt it. The third mill was built by J.W. Bowser and was the most improved pattern. It gained reputation through the county and other counties for good work and was patronized from near and far.

Among other early business men may be mentioned F.M. and Caesar Echman, Neese and Keefe, Drs. I.T. Ross, Starkey, Larimore and Hardy. Early school houses and churches were up-to-date and every interest of the community was looked after with great care and earnestness. The village soon rose to be an important trading center for the township and has held the position to the present time.

Today, Whitestown has some 600 residents, who like their forefathers strive to build, expand and create a healthy community to meet all needs

and interest. Although it has had no boom or lays no claim to greatness, the people are bound together by an indescribable loyalty that personifies the entire atmosphere of the town.

There has been some building on the outskirts and the town has had some face-lifting. Of particular pride to the folks of the town is the fairly new consolidated Perry-Worth Elementary School. It no longer has a high school, but this building is still used as a beehive of activity.

Whitestown has a Town Board, headed by Lowell Hull with James Gamble and John C. Myers, Jr. serving as members. Phyllis Johnson is town clerk-treasurer and Magistrate of the Court is Bradley Garrison.

Don Sortor is Town Marshal, not only handling the law of the community, ensuring the safety of its citizens, but also has charge of city water utilities and has been instrumental in promoting Pioneer Days.

The community has a Volunteer Fire Department and is presently in the throes of having its first sewage system, replacing the individual septic tanks that have been in operation for years.

The Masonic Hall, the Town Hall, where all official business is transacted including elections, the churches—Lutheran, Methodist and Baptist, the Lions Park with its many recreational facilities are the center of community activities today along with the Legion.

The history of Whitestown could not be written without mentioning one old-timer Clyde Laughner, who died in 1965. He served as official U.S. Weather Observer for over 50

years and had a drug store which was far above the average of such stores in county towns.

Today business is varied in Whitestown including food stores, restaurant, gas stations, tavern, pool room, barber shop, meat shop, small

industries, a branch of Citizens Bank and Trust and other firms to meet the varying needs.

Whitestown has been built on a firm foundation, established by her forefathers to whom Pioneer Days is a special salute.

Whitestown Plans Pioneer Days Fete

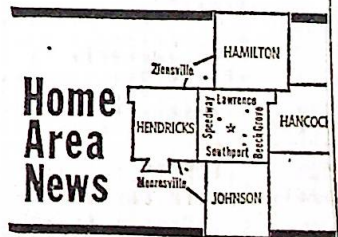
STAR HOME AREA REPORT

A pioneer days celebration at Whitestown, a circus at Fishers and a tractor-pulling contest at Tipton heads a full slate of activities north and northwest of Indianapolis over the extended Labor Day weekend.

Old-fashioned beer gardens, greased pig and watermelon-eating contests and carnival booths will be among the attractions at the third annual Whitestown Pioneer Days tomorrow and Sunday.

A PARADE will open activities at 10 a.m. Events to follow include a beard contest, husband and hog-calling contests, an egg toss, street dance, sack race and the Cowboy Bob television show.

The Carson-Barnes Circus, which boasts the biggest tent currently in use by a circus



company, will set up shop on 126th Street at the intersection of Ind. 37 and I-69 for three shows each day, tomorrow through Monday.

A fish fry will be held over the weekend in conjunction with the circus' visit.

THE tractor-pulling contest is the result of a challenge issued to Hamilton County farmers by farmers in Tipton County.

It will be held at 1 p.m. tomorrow on the Tipton County Fairgrounds.

Pioneer Days Are Finalized

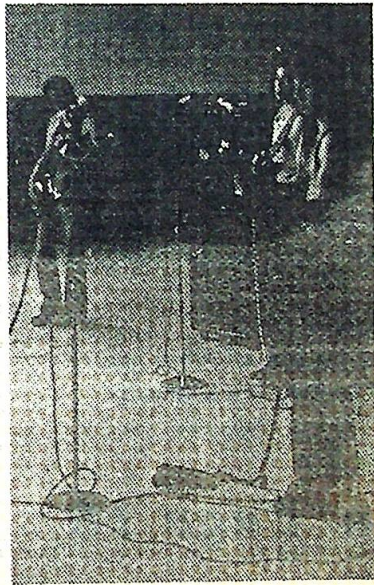

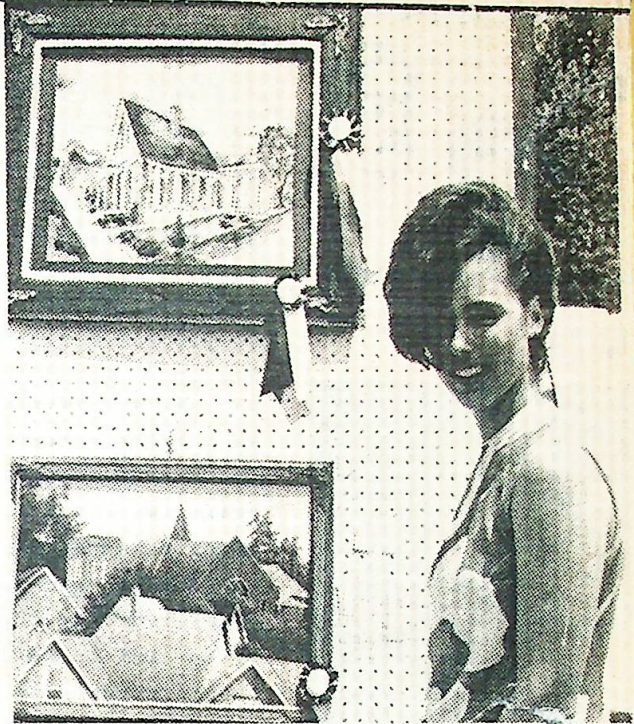

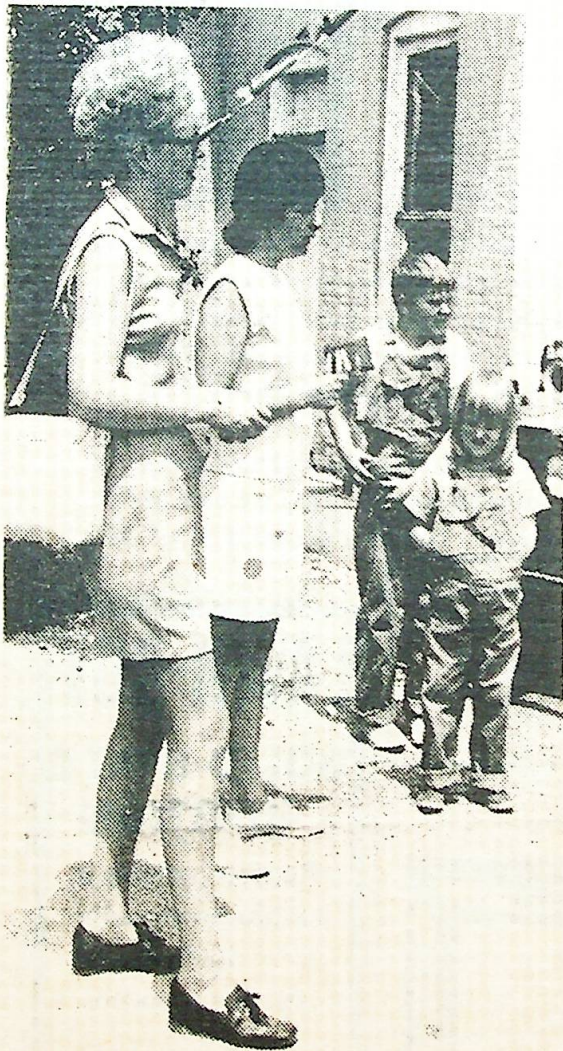

Looking forward to seeing all of you again next year, we repeat, Thank You.

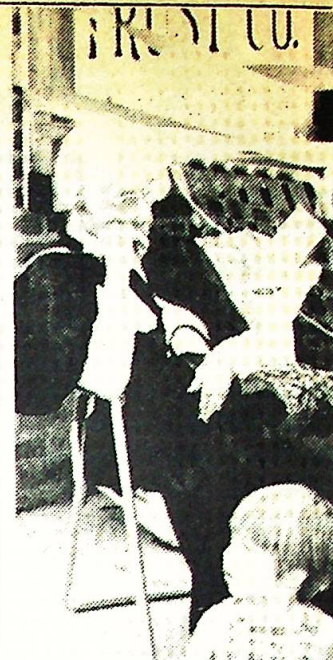

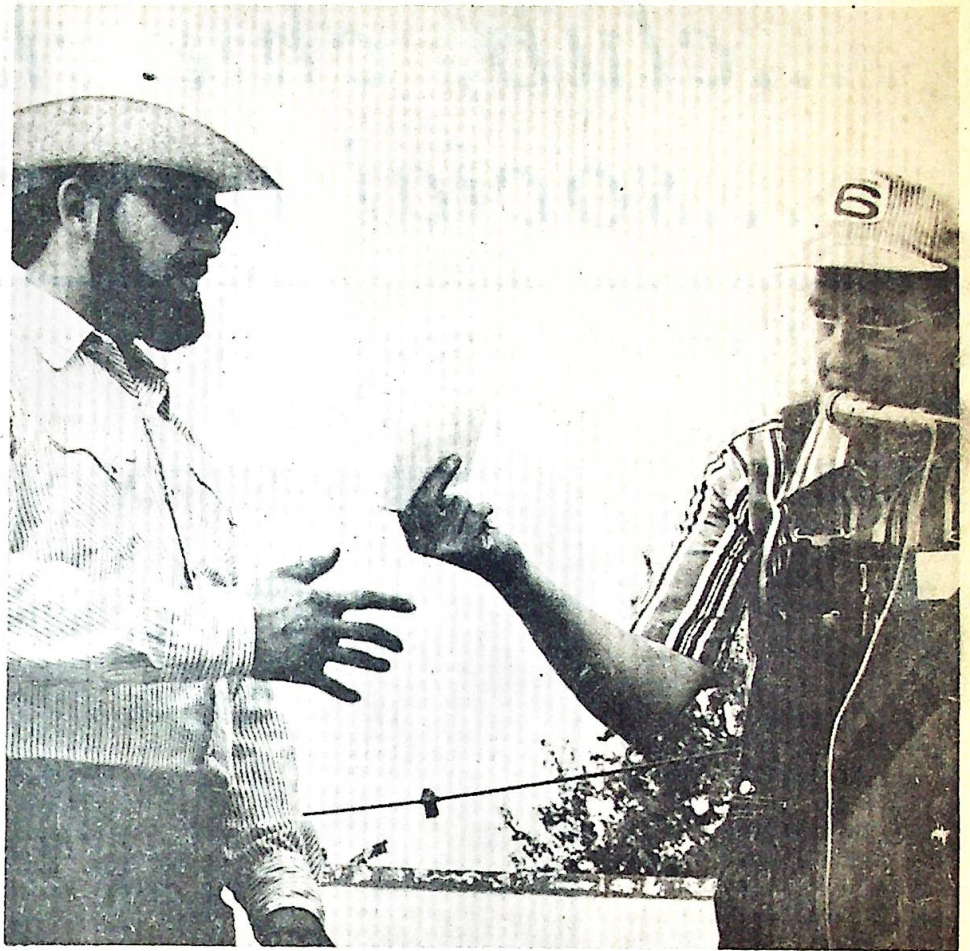
Janet Isenhower took the trophy for the husband calling contest, and Luis Wiley won the Hog Calling.
